The War Virtually Ended. The Surrender of Napoleon and Capitulation of McMahon's Army.

Want of space has prevented the publishwhich took place on Saturday last, but when we say that Napoleon has surrendered and McMahon's army has capitulated-that the former is a prisoner of war in the hands of King William, and that the latter, also a prisoner, is badly wounded and reported to be dead-we give nearly all that it is possible to glean from the wordy despatches that is worth publishing. It was also rumored that Bazaine and the entire garrison at Metz had capitulated, but later reports contradict this rumor, although he is said to be surrounded by about 150,000 Prussian

World of Tuesday has his to say: News from the seat of war to-day has lost nearly all its interest in the vastly more stirring and startling news which comes to us from the capital of France. The tidings of the disaster of Sedan and of the Mr. Bailey nominated B. Milton Speer, surrender of the Emperor were received in Paris with a deep feeling of sorrow, which at once, however, gave way to an irrepressible feeling of indignation and sternest determination of resistance to the enemy. As the first step to this great work, the empire was formally declared to be abolished. mighty revolution, sweeping away in an hour the glittering fabric reared by twenty years of imperial power, was accomplished as calmly as the passing from night into day. The people declared France a republic. Provisional government, composed of the leading members of the republican party, was installed. General Trochu accepted the position of Governor of Paris, charged with the national defence. The Empress left the city unopposed at night for Belgium, and France, which, on Sunday night was an empire lying in the dust, rose on Monday morning a republic armed to the teeth. The news has already begun to produce an immense excitement throughout Europe. Ireland in particular is alive with sudden hope. England, thoroughly alarmed, begins to menace Prussia, as vesterday she reviled France, bent only on stopping the war at no matter what cost to the rights or liberties of others. From Russia a menacing rumor comes of intervention. Italy begins to sympathise openly with the French people. What the effect will be of this great and profound change in the aspect of affairs upon the Prussian government remains to be seen.
