On Saturday afternoon, Sept. 17th, we were visited by three gentlemen. Messrs. J. P. Talbot, Horace Jones, and Alex. Smith, residents of Philadelphia, who gave us a thrilling description of their adventures in the hemlock forests of Elk county a few weeks ago. The story of their trials and privations in that fearfully wild and inhospitable region, sounds more like romance than actual fact, but they assure us that nothing is described but what actually occurred. It is well known that those deep, dark, and almost imperetrable forests are dangerous places for travelers to get lost in, but the reader can hardly realize that the danger is as great as that experienced by these gentlemen. Mr. Talbot, it appears, recently made a purchase of several hundred acres of timber land in Elk county, and en the 25th day of August he left Philadelphia in c mpany with his two frierds, Smith and Jones, for the purpose of examining his purchase, with a view of offering some of it for sale. They arrived salely at St. Mary's in due season, and as the lands lay about twenty-five miles from that place, they concluded to go on foot, carrying nothing but India rubber blankets and provisions sufficient to last them four or five days, together with a long rifle each. On the 28th of August they left the little village and struck out boldly into the wilderness. At night they kindled a fire at the foot of a wide spreading hemlock, near a stream of water, partook of their bornely fare, and then composed themselves for rest under their blankets. The darkness and gloom seemed impenetrable-all was quiet as the grave, save the occasional hoot of an owl. In the morning they resumed their journey and trudged on through the wilderness. Occasionally a frightened deer started up and bounded away, but nothing else occurred to give them any cause of ularm. The land was found on the third day, and after traveling over it for many miles, they began to retrace their steps towards the settlement. which they hoped to reach about the first or second day of September. Late in the afternoen of the fourth day a terrific thunder storm came up, and they were compelled to seek shelter under the branches of a venerable hemlock, whose moss covered trunk and thick foliage gave evidence of great age .--The storm soon burst upon them with fearful fury. The very air grew thick, and darkness set in. The lightning flashed, and it lit up the whole forest in almost one continnous glare of blinding light, while the thunder crashed, roated and reverberated through those gloomy ravines as if it would shake the mighty trees from their roots and hurl them at their feet. The wind blew a hurricane, and the crashing of falling trees, as they were leveled, caused a feeling of profound fear to come over them, as they knew not the moment the old monarch under which they stood would fall before the driving blast and crush them in its rains. A blinding flash of lightning, followed by one of the most tremendous peals of thunder they ever heard, caused them to crouch closer to the trunk of the old tree, while the splinters of another, not forty feet from where they stood, were rained around them. The boit had struck and shivered it into a thousand small fragments, but they luckily escaped, only being considerably stunned by the force of the electric current. The storm continued with unabated fury

for two hours or more, and they found it impossible to proceed any further that night. Owing to the drenching rain they were unable to kindle a fire. This was unfortunate, as those gloomy forests abound with wild cats, and in the absence of fire they do not hesitate to attack any one. They composed | Bot GHT AND SOLD AT MARKET RATES. themselves as best they could at the foot of the tree, not daring to close an eye in sleep, as they knew not at what moment a wild cat might spring upon them. All went well until about eleven o'clock, when they heard a slight sound in the brush, and peeping out in the darkness they discovered two fiery eyes glaring upon there. They knew that a wild cat was approaching, and their rifles were grasped more firmly. The fierce animal waiked three times around the tree, as if meditating how to attack them, gradually drawing nearer each time. At last it stopped directly in front of them and seemed crouching as if to spring upon them. At this critical juncture Talbot discharged his rifle directly at the animal. With a fearful screech that filled them with fear, the wild cat bounded into the brush, and when the echoes of the rifle had died away all was still and a deeper and more imponetrable gloom ettled down upon them. An hour had scarcely elapsed however when to their horror the fiery eyeballs of two more wild cats suddenly flashed upon them out of the thick, musky darkness. They stood erect and grasped their arms in the attitude of charge bayonets. The animals slowly approached and seemed intent upon doing mischief. As they could not see to reload their rifles, and as Talbot's gun was discharged, they were compelled to exercise the greatest caution in order to make their fire effective in the event of a spring from the animals. The wild cats walked around several minutes-then stopped an instant-when, quick as thought. one of them, giving a low growl, sprang at , the appalled adventurers. As luck would have it, Smith caught the animal on the end of his rifle, and, pulling the trigger at that moment, sent a ball through its heart. It rolled off, uttering a frightful yell, and by the kicking and scratching in the busiles they knew it was wounded. At the same moment they all yelled as loud as they could, which seemed to frighten the other, and it bounded into the bushes and disappeared. They were not disturbed again during the night. They left the place as soon as possible and hastened to the Alpine House, St. Mary's, well nigh exhausted with the night's watching, and glad to get out of the horrible wilderness. So great was the excitement through which they had passed that terrible night, that the reaction caused each one to he attacked with illness, which lasted three days before they were able to travel. Old hunters informed them that they made a hair breadth escape, as those animals are usually very ferocious in the absence of fire. The three adventurers left on the evening train for Philadelphia, fully satisfied that a night in the wilderness of Elk county, under such circumstances, is anything but pleasant or romantie. That night of horror will never be effaced from their memories, and it is doubtful whether they will ever attempt such an adventure again without being accompanied by an experienced hunter as a guide.-Williamsport Gazette.
