Wonders of Easter Island. Monumental Remains of an Extinct and Unknown Race.

In the middle of the vast Pacific ocean, three thousand miles distant from the nearormula by which your Rosadalis is made est continent, rises the mysterious Easter and find it an excellent compound of island, abounding with the remains of remote antiquity, which greatly interested and perplened a party of savans who recently visited them. The island is about forty miles in circumference, barren, without trees, destitute of resources, inhabited by a few savages, who lead the most miserable existence imaginable. But upon this narrow strip of land, so barren and unproductive, the astonished eye of the explorer bematism; send me four bottles, as I wish holds a forest of gigantic stone statues, about the origin and meaning of which the race around them knows absolutely nothing. The question concerning them presented for solution are, what do they represent? Whose handiwork are they, and now came they there? There are no metals on Easter Island, nor even silex; only a few hard species of stong are found capable of being fashioned into axes, with which perhaps those mysterious statues were bewn .--The stone of which they are formed is found neither upon the island nor any of the surrounding islands; their number, dimensions and character forming a strange contrast to the narrowness and poverty of the place whereon they are constructed. How could this barren island have nourished a race of men capable of raising such monuments? Where is this race? and what country do they still inhabit?
