Johnstown, April 19, 1871. DEAR FREEMAN-A friend direct from California dropped in with us last Saturday and writing as early as we usually do. He conversed thus wise : There are 250 stations on The road as far as Salt Lake or Ogden station, den to Omaha it is called the Union Pacific cars to sleep in, if one has the money to pay poor chance for wheat in California on account of the dry season. The people were commencing to burn the "tules," or rush swamps, which are dry in summer, in order to plant crops, Tide water runs a great way back in the Sacramento and St Joaquin rivers. It reaches Stockton, on the latter river. A new railroad is being built up the St Joaquin river. San Francisco is doing an immense Pacific, China and Japan trade. The harbor is check full of vessels all the time. He stopped at Montana, five hundred miles west of Salt Lake, from the railroad. Here quartz crushing is the order of the day. Immense mills are running day and night, and the gold is gathered from the dust by the aid of quicksilver, which collects the fine, invisible particles of gold together, and repulses all other matter. The route is per fectly safe for travelers, and the 500 mile trip can be made in four and one half days. There has been a very open winter in Montana, and not cold, the thermometer never reaching more than 33 degrees below zero! Towns and settlements are growing up rapidly all along the two Pacific roads and through all the fertile val'eys near the route. There is a branch south to Denver, Colorado Territory, 110 miles n length and one to Salt Lake City, south, 90 niles in length. Towns are rapidly springing up along these branch roads. 
