LOCAL AND PERSONAL.

We are sure some annuals in all the departments of our previous issue could be made that could be dispensed with the saving of at least two thousand dollars a year. It takes all in all, about \$25,000 per year to run the whole municipal machine, and still no extra tax improvement is made in any department. The description of the Public Square referred to is really worth a republication.

EXEMPTIONS FROM U. S. LICENSE.—By a recent act of Congress, the following classes and names are exempted from paying the license fee to the general government: Apothecaries, architects, assessors, auctioneers, bakers, barbers, &c., bowling alleys, billiard tables, all kinds of brokers, including stock dealers, builders and contractors, butchers, claim agents, clerks, collectors, conveyancers, wholesale dealers, retail dealers, dentists, eating houses, exhibitions not otherwise provided for, express couriers and agents, gift enterprises, grinders of coffee and spices, horse-dealers, and innkeepers. We are glad to see that these classes are exempted, and that they are not burdened with a license fee. The law is a good one, and it is well that it should be so.
