Johnston, Esq., the eighteenth on the list of prominent democrats thus far presented by that excellent journal. Robert Lipton Johnston, who is at present a member of the Democratic State Executive Committee, is one of the hardy mountaineers of Cambria County, Pennsylvania, and a prom inent member of the Ebensburg bar-a bar long noted for legal acumen and brilliancy of wit. Of this bar Mr. Johnston has been a leading member for nearly a quarter of a century.
He is, however, a native of Huntingdon County. He was born at old Huntingdon Furnace, Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania, January 7th, 18b. He is of Scotch-Irish de-

American born, of Scotch parentage.

The difficulties encountered in acquiring an gorges of Huntingdon County, before the introduction of either canals or railroads, can scarcely be realized in this age of progress.
