SCRAPS OF LOCAL HISTORY -A correspondent writing from this place to the Johnstown Tribune, after referring to the meeting of the then approaching term of our County Court and the installation of the new officers thereof, proceeds to give the following items of local. judicial history which we deem worthy of reproduction.

Since I have touched upon the subject, per-uit me to say a word or two more about Courts

and Court Houses.
You have heard of Beulah, the "deserted viilage," and know all about its rise, growth, and ultimate and absolute downfall. But do you know that, in violent antichation of being named the county-seat of Cambria upon its named the county-seat of Cambria upon its erection into a county, the people of that enterprising burg actually built a Court House inside their corporate limits, furnished it, and kept it in perfect order against the coming of the tribunal of justice for whom it was intended? The structure was leg, and was built the latter part of the last century. Part of its foundation wall is standing to this day.

But the roseate dreams of Beulah were never realized. The county-seat was fixed at Ebensburg, and Beulah and its Court House went under. It was about the year 1806. Judge Addison was judge of the Circuit Court for a Western Pennsylvania district, and for some reason or another adjourned the body over which he

or another adjourned the body over which he presided from Somerset to Beulah, where it remained in session for a season. This is a fact, yet I venture to say that not more than one out of ten of the present inhabitants of Cambria knew it before reading this. And so Beulah, though she didn't get the Court, at least had a Court!

Did you ever walk over from Liuton's hotel to our new jail? If you did, you passed on the right hand side of the first square on your route an old log building. Inside that building, in 1807, was held the first Cambria County Court. Judge Young was the first P. J. It was subsequently used as a jail, church, and school-house-to-day it is a cow-stable. The storms of sixty years have left to us only a faint outline of its original proportions, yet it is cherished as affording a contrast between itself and our present Court House as fair as will be the contrast between the latter and our new Court House, when we get it.
