### JOHNSTOWN, April 24, 1872. Dear Freeman-The crazy man, generally nown as "Kaiser," was found dead in a stable in Sharpsburg, on last Saturday morning, and was buried on Sunday. He was followed to his final earthly resting place by about 2,000 people of all ages and both sexes. Kaiser's right name was John Scheidly, or, as some have it, John Gscheidele. He was born in Michelboch, on the river Blitz, county of Gelidort, and king dom of Woertown, Germany, in the year 1812. le came to this country in 1853 as a peddler. He afterward dealt in scrap iron. He first came to New York, then to Baltimore, and subsequently to this place, where he became de-ranged. Trouble and disappointment were upposed to be the cause of this derangement of mind. Loving as he did the daughter of a Lutheran minister in Germany, his vas not reciprocated, and this caused him great mental trouble. Kaiser was bonest and up-

#### litzin District.

MR. EDITOR-The Kittanning Coal Company of this place suspended work on the 16th of Jan-uary last, because the miners would not cou-sent to dig coal at a reduction of 10 cents per on. The miners had only one day given them to consult over the matter, when they unaniagreed to quit work and appealed to ow workmen to divide their work with

them, which they honorably did with the ex-ception of the Blair Iron and Coal Company. The bosses backed down from the agreement they had made with the miners. However, the miners of the Kittanning Coal Co., faced the storm, and with all the scarcity of work, it appears that their bread multiplied, like the manna in the desert, because their cause was just. On the lift inst, the bosses of the Kittanentered into a settlement of the difficulties exsting between them-the miners not only re-alning their former prices, but also making a gain of 7 per cenf. over old rates. The miners suffered considerably, yet they taught those bosses a lesson that will not be forgotten for ome time. The great domand, however for ron at present justifies them in giving the

iners their just demands. The miners of Johnstown based their demnd on the same principle as the miners of bio-that is, on the great raise in the prices of iron in the market, which would afford the miner one dollar per ton at the present time. If the prices of iron had a downward tendency, ow soon the Johnstown Company would resort

to the lowering of miners' wages. The miners of the Blair Iron and Coal Co., of Bennington district, are still waiting with pa-tience, expecting that the Company will be as liberal with them as they were with the Johns-town miners, and by so doing, it might save a troublesome strike. I sincerely hope that the Blair Iron and Coal Co. will not remain silent many days on this question. If they do, it is certain that the miners will make their demand. In proportion to the advance on iron, which they would be justified in doing. That demand might not be pleasing to the Blair Iron and might not be pleasing to the Blair Iron and Coal Co.
