
OUR COMMON SCHOOLS.

THE FIFTH THING. Effort on the part of pupils is wanted in all our schools. Five times more could be learned in one winter term thur is learned. There is no doubl about this. Just let a very valuable reward be offered to each pupil for a special effort, and then see the result. they can progress rapidly for rewards, they can without them. In our colleges, pupils often have five or six studies at the same time, such as Latin, Greek, Geometry, Bookkeeping, Algebra, Philosophy and History, with heavy lessons in each, say a page in Casar or Sallast, or one hundred lines in Virgil, and they learn all their lessons. Some of these pupils are quite young, the most b. ng boys of from twelve to eighteen years of age. How do they learn so much? They study. Study is the only key to knowledge, During my thirty-eight years' experience in teaching, it was only occasionally that I met with pupils who studied hard. In the year 1841 a boy named McLaughlin solved all the sums in "The Western Calculator" in six weeks, and explained one or two each day, besides attending to other studies. In 1843 a young man named McKeever went thro' "Gummere's Surveying" in eight weeks, protracting all the figures and entering in a book all the calculations. In 1870 a boy named Ashton commenced to study Geography, and at first did not know what a hemisphere was, or in fact anything about this branch of study. 




