

LOVERS' LEAP.

A ROMANCE OF INDIAN LIFE.

No summer tourist of a romantic turn, happening to be near Lansing, Iowa, will omit seeing the "Lovers' Leap," as it is called, of which this Indian legend is told: On the whole line of the Mississippi river there is not, perhaps, any grander scenery than that about Lansing, Iowa. A short distance below the town, on the west side of the river, stands a noble bluff, sloping up almost perpendicular to the height of four hundred feet. The base of the bluff, which is only a few rods from the water's edge, is fringed by a sloping beach, thick set by rough, jagged rocks, among which a few stunted trees and shrubs grow. The summit of the bluff falls off gracefully into a fine level tract of land, covered in summer with a luxuriant growth of grass and flowers, while the brink of the steep descends abruptly in a broad, naked rock, from which a charming view of the river, both above and below, can be had. There were two young men in the company, Waw-kaw-chaw-kaw, Coming Thunder, and Rob-kaw, the great hunter. They were both great favorites with the father of the maiden, and he had often earned income to the Great Spirit for victory to the one, and practiced countless incantations that the other might return safe and successful from the hunt.

Thus the matter stood on the night when the band stood about the camp-fire on the broad rock overlooking the great river.
