#### THE MOORE TRAGEDY .- Arguments upon Motion for a New Trial .- On Monday evening inst the case of the Commonwealth vs. Michael Moore, convicted at June Sessions of

murder in the first degree for killing his wife near Mineral Point, was called up for the surpose of hearing the arguments for and against the granting of a new trial, as moved for by the prisoner's counsel at the me of Immense Meeting at the Court House. his conviction. The reasons then presented for seeking another trial were reported in full in this paper, and hence we need not reproduce them here. Since then, however, additional testimony has been taken, the most important of which is the sworn statement of Mr. S. A. Reynolds, an employee of the Pa. R. R. Co., who testifies that he was working in the vicinity of Mineral Point at the time of the tragedy, that about 7 o'clock on the morning of the day that the body of the murdered woman was found he was walking along the railroad track from the direction of South Fork and towards Mineral Point, and that at a short distance east of the place where the foot-prints led from the scene of the tragedy to the railroad, he met a suspicious looking man walking in the direction of South Fork, and that he noticed that a portion of the stranger's coat-tail was burned off. The deposition of this witness, as well as the testimony of several others who had been examined for the purpose of

attempting to prove an alibi, was read by Col. Linton, one of the prisoner's counsel, after which Mr. Tierney, on behalf of the Commonwealth, delivered an argument in opposition to the granting of a new trial for the reasons first offered. Col. A. Kopelin folowed for the prisoner, reviewing at length the various reasons which had been submited, and at the conclusion of his remarks his colleague, Mr. Linton, delivered a most able and facid argument touching upon the reasous offered and also upon the material portions of the after-discovered evidence, which might have had some weight with the jury


