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Address of the National Democratic Committee.

The following address has been issued by the Chairman of the National Democratic Committee:

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How Hartranft's Majority was Made Up.

Day by day and hour by hour the evidence of fraud at the late election accumulates.

The undersigned, judges of the election, signed no such return of paper, and will be qualified that the true vote for Governor was as follows:

By exposing the above fraud you will oblige the friends of reform in the Fifteenth ward, and show how our return election judges alter the returns to suit their own partisan way of fixing up election returns.

Philadelphia, October 11, 1872. And just here we state the fact that in the Fourteenth ward there was fraudulent addition made to the returns of two hundred votes, and in the Thirteenth ward of we have no means of knowing; but it is perfectly safe to assert that the returns of the whole Twenty-ninth were thus manipulated, and that Colonel Metcalf's statement that at least 25,000 fraudulent votes were added to the returns is correct.

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Philadelphia, Oct. 12, 1872. We have lost a battle, but the field should hold high carnival in Philadelphia and jayal our ranks throughout the state; but the insolent triumph should receive increased exertions.

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
