THE SHOOTING OF MOORE.-The Pittsburg Disputch of last Saturday contained a wanton and scarrilous attack on Sheriff Bonacker, of this county, induced by the shooting of Michael Moore in his cell in the --- November 1, 1872. county jail by the Sheriff on last Monday week. Other papers of lesser note, the Altoona Radical for instance, have also attacked Sheriff Bonacker. The article in the Disputch substantially charges that the shooting of Moore by Sheriff Bonacker was cowardly, unnecessary and unprovoked. Now what are the facts? The Sheriff was fully aware that Moore was diligently employed in attempting to work his way out of his cell. He therefore, having received his death-warrant on the Saturday previous, determined to remove him to another cell, and requested ex-Sheriff Myers and Conductor Quartz, of the E. & C. R. R., to be present when Moore's removal to the new cell prepared for him memory the following: Gold watch, Miwould take place. When the Sheriff, in chael Berry; silver watch, Col. T. A.
