Who are entitled to pensions.—The following provisions of the new pension act will be of special interest to soldiers and their relatives everywhere: All persons who have lost a leg above the knee, and are so disabled thereby that they cannot use an artificial limb, shall be rated in the third class, and receive one hundred dollars per month. All persons having lost the hearing of both ears, to receive thirteen dollars per month. Section five provides that the rate of eight dollars per month shall apply to those who are blind in one eye, and who are unable to gain their living by their own labor, and whose condition is such that they are entitled to pensions.
