But there are some of the more prominent practices that will be noticed here. The manner of living fifty years ago was quite different from the manner of living at the present time. The thials of the early set-

tlers more nearly resembled the adventures of the Pilgrim Fathers than those of our own times. CERARIN'S LANDS.

The beanfiful meadow, the bright field waving with golden grain, and the shining otchard of fo-day, fragrant with blossons, were once dense forests covered with weeds bushes and heavy timber, both standing and fallen. All these had to be removed by the hand of man. The brush had to be gathered, the logs chopped and rolled, the suplings grubbed out, and all burned up. The rooty ground had to be plowed and the roots cu away. All these things required combined labor. Houses and barns had to be built. which individual strength could not accouplish.

#### THE FROLIC.

As a consequence, neighbors would andemble together and work in concert, and this

was called a frolic. There was the grubbing trolic, the chopping frolic, the solling trolic, the plowing frolic, and the raising frolic .-These gatherings were the occasion of much mnocent amusement, which had a tendency for sweeten the toil of pioneer life. After th day's hard work was done, varied athletic exercises were indulged in, such as wrestling, jumping, and dancing.

#### SHOOTING MARK.

Not unfrequently the old flint lock was called into requisition. This would be taken down from its resting place, beneath the rough joists of the old cabin, cleaned out. bullets cast, patches cut, a mark prepared, and the skill of each marksman tested ; and the shots were generally well placed, cor. sidering the slow-fire implement used. Evory than was a marksman in those days, and the best marksman ranked next in honor to the minister.

#### HUNTING:

The nights were sometimes spent in "coon hunting." The raceoon would be treed by dogs, and then a fire would be built in close proximity to the tree, which afforded ligh for the choppers. The tree would be fel and the dogs let loose for the great struggl of catching the game. On more than our occasion a wild-cat would be caught instead of a "coon," when the struggle for life wonly e fearful, and as interesting as a Spanis bull fight. Trapping was also attended by many of these early settlers, and wild seasts of different kinds would be thus ensnared and caught.

### PROGRESS.

As the settlement became older the grad Ling and altopping frolics were separated by corn huskings, apple brater bollings and scatching frolies. The young ladies and gentlemen of the actgliborhood would convenu at a certain dwelling-house and choose partners, after which the scutching foolic would commence in good earnest. A dance would follow in the evening, and the night would be spent in "tripping the light, fantastic toe" to vocal music drawled out at intervals by the same person who called out the figures. Plenty to eat and something strong to drink characterized all these prim hite assemblages. Fifty years ago it would have been as remarkable to witness a frolie without ardent drinks as it would now be remarkable to witness a party at which ardent drinks are used.

### RELIGION.

And yet people seemed to be quite as religious (pious) in those days as at present .--There were no Sunday schools then, ho inarumental music in churches, no choirs, and the preaching was generally done in houses. barns, or tents, but there certainly was much
