AN AWFUL SPECTACLE-THREE MEN BURNED TO DEATH AT AN OIL WELL, -A terrible affair occurred in Butler county on Saturday last —an accident so awful in its nature that the community where it occurred will be appuled at the thought for a ong time to come. Messrs. Preston & 'o., had been engaged in bering for oil near Millersburg, but success was not anticipated so soon. Work was about to be suspended on Saturday evening, when sudlenly and without the least warning the belt was struck and a volume of oil rushed to the surface and shot up two hundred feet above the derrick. The cheer that greeted the success was of short duration. for the oil took fire and a mighty mass of roaring flame spread itself far up in the heavens and threatened destruction to all persons near. With one wild cry of alarm the spectators began to run from the terrible yet beautiful sight when it was suddenly remembered that three men had been at work near the derrick. An agonized shriek from a woman told the story and as the low moaning cry of horror spread, those present sunk all thoughts of their own safey in a frantic effort to rescue the victims at the well. But it was too late. When found the remains of the men were almost consumed and naught but masses of quivering flesh from which an horrible odor arose, remained of the strong men full of health and hope an hour before. The terrible affair has cast a gloom over the place. and the awful occurrence is the theme of sorrowful conversation throughout the oil ountry .- Pittsburg Dispatch.

The Back-Pay Grab bill, approved March 3, contains the following rascally provision:

"Hereafter Representatives and Delegates elect to Congress whose credentials in due form of law have been duly filed with the Clerk of the House of Representatives in acordance with the provisions of the act of Congress approved March 3, 1863, may reeive their compensation monthly from the beginning of their term until the beginning of the first session of each Congress, upon a certificate in the form now in use, which certificate shall have like force and effect as is given to the certificate of the Speaker under existing laws: Provided, That in case the Clerk of the House of Representatives shall be notified that the certificate of elecion will be contested, his name shall not be placed upon the roll of the members elect so as to entitle him to be paid until he shall have been sworn in as a member or until such contest shall be determined.
