He was a member of the Reform Convention which framed the Constitution of 1838, and in March. 1849, became Secretary of the Treasury under President Taylor, but resigned his office in 1850 when Vice President Fillmore succeeded to the Presidency. During the war he was Attorney General under the administration of Governor Curtin. As a lawyer he stood in the very foremost rank of the profession-as a citizen blemish.

The clock, which was made with no ther tools than two common jackknives, s eight feet high and four feet broad. Its frame is of the gothic style of architecture. a globe, on the top of which is attached a small gilded cross. On the front of the clock there are four dial plates; one shows the day of the week, another shows the day of the month, another the minutes and actions of a minute, and the other the hour of the day, These dials are carved n a most unique manner, having emblemtic figures upon them and around them of almost every imaginable description .-Above the dial plates is a semi-circle gallery, extending around about bulf the width of the frame-work of the clock.
