SHIP ACAPULOO, Kingston, Jamaica, April 17, 1874.

DEAR FREEMAN-It is a great sight to see the sea and be sea-sawed to death. Our ship should be called Aca-puke-o, as 250 out of 200 passengers were mocking the pea-fowl three hours after we left Sandy Hook. We left New York -the city of policemen-on the 11th (Saturday) at 2 p. m., and we have made 240 miles, or four at 2 p. m., and we have made 240 miles, or four degrees, every day, until to-day, directly south. Last night, however, we changed course to south-west, steering for Jamaica, having pass-ed the east end of Cuba. We didn't see any belligerent war vessels, nor anything else ex-cept a few porpoises and about a dozen sailing vessels, which we sighted since we left Nova Etherico.


