OUR MINERAL WEALTH .- Under this caption the Osceola Reveille of the 3d inst.

The western slope of the Alleghenics was at one time in our past history considered the least valuable region in the State, but more recent developments have shown that Pennsylvania's richest deposits of mineral wealth are buried beneath the surface of our rough and rugged wilds.

rugged wilds.
So little importance has been attached to the value of this part of the State, that no attempt was ever made to record its early history. No stirring details of bloody battles fought with "the red-skin braves" on these mountain slopes, thrill the patriotic heart of the historical reader, and even tradition, the million tongued trumpeter of doubtful heroes of more favored places, sings no song of honor to revive the forgotten giory of departed warriors slain on the hills and vallies that surround our peaceful, pleasant little fown.

The mineral stea of this region includes within its limits. Clearfield, Centre and Cambria counties, emiracing all the territory be-

bria counties, embracing all the territory be-tween Clinten and Somerset. Indiana and Jefferson, adjulning, are also mineral counties. but our purpose, at present, is to notice the mineral resources of Clearfield county in connection with Centre and Cambrid. A series of articles on the early history of the latter county, written by R. L. Johnston. an able and well known representative of the Cambria county bar, appeared may years ago, and attracted considerable attention from the

> FATHER LEMKS AND HIS SCHOOLS .-The many friends in Cambria county of the venerable and much beloved Father Lemke otherwise known as Father Henry, will peruse with interest the following from a late issue of the Elizabeth (N. J.) Herald:

It has little of the tra-ditional gloom supposed to characterize the ditional gloom supposed to characterize the institutions of which it is a representative; but built in a light modern style of architecture, it might be taken for a college, rather than the house of a religious Order. It is healthfully and pleasantly located, and when time has added to the growth of the trees by which it is surrounded, it will be a place of unneural attractions. This is the convent of the Benedictine Sisters; or more properly "St. Walburga's Convent of the Order of St. Benedict." Several years ago, on the application of twenty-six ladies who wished to devote them-selves to that life of usefulness which they believed could be found in the education of their sex within the seclusion of a cloister, the Leg-islature granted a charter, and the Order was founded. The crection of the building which they now occupy is due to the exertions and sacrifices of Father Henry, at present the paster of St. Henry's Parish; but then of St. Michael's Church on East Jersey street.
