A SERIOUS FIRE. -On Sunday morning last, between 2 and 3 o'clock, a frame building located immediately in the reat of Mrs. Garley's residence, in the West Ward, was discovered to be on fire. The alarm was given by Mr. James Myers, night watchman for the P. R. R., at the depot, and the Dauntless fire engine was soon on the ground. It was discovered to be impossible to save the burning building from destruction, and the vouring element. The adjacent buildings, including the residences of John Perilon Esq., Mrs. Gurley, and Mr. C. T. Roberts, were in immirent flanger for a time, the roof and weatherbearding of the former being frequently in flames, but through the hereulean efforts of the firemen the conflagration was confined to the building in which it driginated. This was owned by Capt. E. E. Dunnegan, of St. Augustine, and was occupied as a furniture manufactory and warehouse by Mr. Abraham Hitchne. The loss of the former was probably \$500, and of the latter about the like sum. Located as the building was in the heart of town, with houses adjoining it in every direction save one, it was a very narrow escape from an exceedingly disastrous conflagration. To the fact that no breath of air was stirring at the time, assisted by the other fact that we are now in the possession of a first-class engine, is attributable the preservation of thousands of dollars' worth of property. A CLEARFIELD COUNTY LADY ROBBED AND MURDERED IN IOWA .- A dispatch to the Chicago Journal, from Des Moines, Ia.,

DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 28. On the 14th of August a well dressed, handsome and affable young woman came to this city and applied for rooms of a merchant over his store for the for rooms of a merchant over his stote for the purpose of carrying on the business of dressmaker. After satisfying himself of her good faith abid virtue he leased her the rooms, and sho at once went to work, conducting herself in a very decent and industrious mann r. This morning she was not seen going to her breakfast, and about noon the merchant below thought he would look after her. Upon conting the door leading to the stairway be discovered great pools of blood, which indicated unorder. The officers were summoned, and the corpse of the victim was found at the head of the stairs, whence she had evidently been dragthe stairs, whence she had evidently been drag-ged from below, where she was killed. The coroner summoned a jury, and an examination was made of letters and papers about the room, from which her name was ascertained to be Mrs. Ellen Burrett, of Clearfield, Pa. She passed herself helde as Mrs. Batter, of Illinois. The plausible clue to the fluorer is that She was pursued by her husband, and murdered at first sight. The corpse was found at the head of a back stairway. The head and face were covered with blood, and both arms and limbs were outstretched. On the left hand were four valuable rings. She had on a chemise, night does and cloth gaiters, which indicated that, hearing a knock at the door, she had hastily gone to see who it was, and on opening the door her mar derer struck her with a blust instrument on

There is as yet no clue to the murderer of Mrs. Ellen Barrett, alias Mrs. Butler. The Coroner's investigation continued throughout to-day, but without developing anything new. Dispatches have been received from Clearfield, Pa. by which it is ascentained that she had a husband living there. Recent letters from her hisband found in her possession indicate that there existed the warmest effection between them, though it is certain that she became dehattched and correpted, and thus descried a husband and child cight years old. She was finely educated, and in her dress and flanner displayed culture and intelligence. This is the sixth investerious murder in the last three years in this city, to which there has been in discovery of the perpetrators of the crime, and the papers are advocating the organization of a Vigilance Committee to clean out all the rookeries which so infest the city, and to which the origin of so much crime is traced.

CRESSEY STATION, Merced Co., Cal., August 19, 1874. DEAR FREEMAN—The threshers have come and gone, and how I know something about threshing. I told you tefore about plowing, heading, and stacking. There were ten stacks on eight hundred acres. The threshers came on Tuesday, Aug. 11th, at 90 clock, and finished to the stacks of the stacks. on Tuesday, Aug. 11th, at 9 o clock, and limined to-day, the 19th, at 9 o'clock, threshing ten stacks eight thousand bushels—in seven days. They were put back by disappointment in get-ting bands and by breaking the threshing machine with a chain which had been left on one of Mr. McKee's stacks the day before coming to our place. They threshed nearly twelve hundred bushels per day, and could have threshed fi icen hundred per day by uninterrupted ruining. They thresh a sack a filiable, and that is two bushel and a peek, or 135 fbs.—The matcherer consists of an english a cheek.

The matchinery consists of an engine, a thresher, a separator, a pintform wagon, and a derrick. They hoist the unthreshed straw up the a
platform by the aid of immense forks operated partorm by the aid of immense forks operated by stellin power. From this platform it is fed litto the thresher. The power that hoists the wheat is called the "crab," and consists of two reversible pulley cylinders, around which the ropes wind and unwind at the pleasure of the man who stands at the lever and transfers the power from one cylinder to another. These forks take up a small wagon lond or a large sled load of straw at one pull, and both forks work all the time. It takes fifteen men to at tend this machine, one engineer tend this machine one engineer, one 'crab' tender, two fork tenders, three platform pitchers, two feeders, one suck sewer, one suck cerrier, one to hauf away the straw, two to hauf water, and one to hose the job. It requires six horses to band water unione to hand the straw, hors, s to hard water undone to hard the straw, and three cooks are kept busy preparing grub for the operators. The next thing in order now is to convey this wheat five miles to the station. If we han! four tens a day it will require fifty days. We will commente harding immediately. Wheat is worth about \$1 per bushel now, but the price will doubtless go up. We intend to store ours in a wavelouse and run the risk to store ours in a warehouse and run the risk of earthquakes, comets, and "sich like."
