of the Pennsylvania Railroad have prepared a new set of rules and regulations for the government of their employes, which go into full effect on Nov. 1st. Below we print an abstract of all of them of interest to the

1. Depot masters and assistants, passenger conductors and brakemen, and baggage masters, must wear suitable badges.

2. No passenger shall ride on an engine or ender without an order from the General or process.

Division Superintendent of motive power.

3. No passengers shall ride on freight trains.

4. Passenger conductors must sent passengers, and see to their comfort and enjoyment as much as possible; see that received. as much as possible; see that none stand on the platform or ride on baggage, mail or express cars; put off passengers refusing to pay at the next station; not permit drunken and disorderly persons on trains, nor allow pro-

6. Baggage agents and masters must handle baggage darefully; the former to charge for extra weight invariably; the latter to carry only such packages bundles, money, etc., as the Division Superintendent authorizes.

7. No tickets on credit.
8. No tickets to persons so intoxicated as to be incapable of taking care of themselves, or who by reason of such condition might risk their lives by traveling; nor to any one incapaole of self care.

9. Loungers are not permitted in telegraph

offices. 10. No persons except employes allowed to II. United States mail agents, express managers, sleeping-ear conductors, porters, news agents, and individuals running private ears are to be regarded and to consider themselves as employes, and conform to these rules and

12. News boys on trains will not be permitted to individually importune or annoy passengers, but may announce, in a low voice, at intervals not exceeding four times in each car, the articles offered for sale. Nor will they be permitted to deposit their papers, books, &c., on the seats of the cars, or in the laps of passengers. 13. All employes are to exercise the utmost


