Crime and Retribution.

OUTRAON UPON A LITTLE GIRL BY A DRUNK-RN HUMAN FIRND-HE IS LYNCHED BY INFURIATED CIPIZENS SOON AFTER.

A New York Herald correspondent gives the following particulars of a fiendish crime perpetrated near Gibson, a small mining village in this State, near the bonadary line, and the subsequent hanging of the villight :

Martin Groves, an ignorant and dissingted man about thirty-five years old, had lived for years on the mountain back of Gibson. He was in the habit of making ceriodical visits to the village, where he avariably became more or less intoxicated.)renk or sober he was always considered a man of bratish and unbridled passions. On Saturday last he was in Gibson. He was not very drunk, and about the middle

of the afternoon was missed. This was omething unusual, as it was his custom to continue his orgies late into the night before departing fer home. As his absence was of no importance it merely excited a assing remark. About two o'clock on aturday afternoon, Mrs. Davis, the widow of a miner, had sent her daughter, about thirigen years of age, on an errand about a mile out of the village. She had not reurned at four o'clock, and her mother becan to grow uneasy about her. A few minutes after four the girl was carried into the house by two men in an almost insenible condition. They said they had found ter lying near the road, in a piece of woods, out half a mile out of the village. Her lothing was badly torn, and her face bleedag from a large but not dangerous cut above the left temple. When spoken to the opened hor eyes and essayed to speak, it the was too weak to articulate. Her story was that she was on her way ome after doing her erraud, and when she reached the piece of woods near Moon's creek she saw Martin Croves sitting by he side of the read. She was afraid of sim, and stopped, undecided whether to go through the woods and come out in the road below him or pass right on. His head was hanging down on his brezst as if he were asleep, and she concluded to go noisclessly by him in the road. When she got about opposite to where he sat he raised his head and then rose to his feet.

"Yes, Martin," said the girl, "but please don't burt me. He made no reply to this, but took held of her by both shoulders and pushed her owards the woods, she screaming loadiy for help, when he struck her a blow with his fist os the side of her head, and she remembers nothing until coming to her senses some time before the men found her.
