

A NEW LOCAL INDUSTRY. Gypsum brought from Southern California is ground into plaster of Paris at the Golden Gate plaster mills, on Main street, between Howard and Folsom. The mills have been running but a short time. The gypsum is brought to the place in blocks weighing from 20 to 100 pounds, and after being broken into paces of a pound or less in weight, is run through a hopper and between millstones of the common fishien. It is bolted and separa-ted into three grades, which are used for build-ing nurphoses, common master casts and fine ing purposes, common plaster casts and fine statuary. The grade used for fertilizing pur-poses is also prepared at the same place. The capacity of the mills is 500 barrels per day.


