THE BILL FOR THE REPEAL OF THE LO-CAL OPTION LAW -Whether or not the House concurs in the amendment in shape of an exceedingly stringent license law which has been made by the Senate to the bill repealing the Local Option act, and at present writing it does not look as if such concurrence is likely to be secured, we have deemed the provisions of the amendment of sufficient interest to many of our readers to give it a place in the FREEMAN. The proposed leg station embodies several features of what is known as the Ohio "Adair law," and has passed second reading, after having been amended so as to make the maximum \$1,000 on sales of \$10,000 per annum and \$100 for sales of \$4,000 and under. The following

is a synopsis of the act proposed: The first section of the bill is identical with the House bill repealing the Local-Option law, approved March 27, 1872.

The second section gives nuthority to the Court of Quarter Sessions at the first or second session of each year, to fix by rule a time at which applications for license and the objections thereto may be heard; for the bresent year licen as may be granted at the third or any earlier session of the court.

The third section provides for the classifica-

tion of inns, botels, and taverns according to the valuation of the yearly rental, and establishes license fees accordingly, from \$1.00 where the rental is \$10,000 down to \$150 for the ninth class where the rental is under \$400 per annum. Provided, that in counties containing over 100,000 inhabitants no license shall be granted for less in \$300, and in towns and cities containing

ond offense is punishable with a \$1,000 fine, a year's imprisonment, and forfeiture of license. Druggists, confectioners, and others are subject to the same penalties.

Section fifth gives informers a fifth of the penalties and of the proceeds of all forfeited ds, the residue to go to the public scho bonds, the residue to go to the public schools.
Section six requires returns from constables
of all licensed and unlicensed taverns; and in
case of "wilful failure" to do so, renders the
constables liable to the penalties of perjury.
Section seven requires persons who sell liquor
to intoxicated persons, whether licensed in un-

licensed, to pay a reasonable compensation to any person who may care and provide for such intoxicated persons.

Section eight gives the husband, wife, parent, child guardian, or employer of any person in the habit of drinking, authority to serve written notice not to sell intoxicating liquor such person; and if any such inquor be said to any person within twelve months of such notice, the vender is made liable in damages not less than \$50 or more than \$400, to be re-
