—The New License Law.—Following is the full text of the license bill as reported by the conference committee of the Senate and House, adopted by both branches of the Legislature, and now going over to the signature of the Governor.

—The House of Representatives, on the 27th day of March, A. D. 1875, adopted the following resolution: Resolved, That the act approved the 27th day of March, A. D. 1875, entitled "An Act to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors and to restrain and regulate the sale of such liquors," be amended so that it shall read as follows:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted, etc., That the act approved the 27th day of March, A. D. 1875, entitled "An Act to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors and to restrain and regulate the sale of such liquors," be amended so that it shall read as follows:

That any person who shall be convicted of the offense of selling, or offering for sale, any liquors, spirituous, wine, or malted liquors, or any mixture thereof, contrary to the provisions of this law, shall be liable to a fine not less than \$200 nor more than \$500, or to imprisonment for not less than 60 days nor more than 120 days, or to both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 13.
