Situated, or rather elevated, on a gi-gantic sand-bill, the sojourners therein have all the pleasures of having a matutioal shower all the pleasures of having a matutibal shower bath of that commodity from 10 A. M. till 4 P. M. every day during the summer. From three to a dozen parties leave here every morning, on pleasure tent-some to the Farrelone Islands, some to Santa Cruz or Montercy, some to Cal-istoga or the Passo de Robles bot springs, and other some, who have not so much wealth to squander, betake themselves across the bay to the sylvan groves of Oakland, and there in-dulge in the innocent amusements of making love, fibring, drinking bad wine, and breaking each other's noses.

It will con-tain 750 rooms, 36 public parlors, 14 private ditto, 9 dining rooms, 27 assembly rooms, 5 ele-vators, 3 billiard rooms, 40 by 96 feet each, the finest bar in the city, and the most impudent clerks that the country can produce. The charges will be moderate—only \$10a day. Can't you come and board here a year or two? The majority of the inhabitants of this city


