- We were visited on Tuesday last by Mr. Summitville shooting affray, who desired report of the transaction in last week's issue, wherein we were led by our informant to say that Mr. Linton was in a stooping posture and in the act of putting a box in the spring when he was struck and knocked down, while the truth of the matter, according to Mr. Johnston, is that Mr. L. was not near the spring at all nor even inside of Messrs. Johnston's field when the blow was site side of the fence from the Johnstons, who were on the r own premises, and was rushing towards Charles Johnston as if intending to assault him with the box, when the latter struck him, not with a club, as has been alleged, but with a small hickory withe which he held in his hand. Mr. Johnston also declares that Mr. Myers was the first to break the peace, inasmuch as he com-menced tearing down Messrs. Johnston's fence and when remonstrated with threatened to shoot Charles Johnston-a threat which he did not attempt to carry out, however, until Mr. Linton had been knocked down, when he fired two shots at each of the Johnstons, one of which inflicted a wound in James Johnston's side and another passed through the sleeve of his coat. Deeming the Johnston brothers worthy of a hearing in their own behalf we freely give place to this their denial of certain alleged facts con-nected with the unfortunate affair.

applying for pardon for convicts should understand. We condense them as follows The Board will sit for the purpose of hearing applications on the first Tuesday of each month; proof of notice of application for pardon must be shown to have been pubished for two consecutive weeks in a county newspaper, the affidavit of the publisher of the journal being required; notice of application having fleen made must be furnished the Judge who tried the case and the District Attorney who prosecuted it; a certified copy of the whole record, including docket entries, etc., as well as a brief statement of the reasons upon which the application is based, notes of evidence taken in the trial, and letters from responsible parties, must be produced; no applications will be considered which are presented to individual members of the Board; all applications and correspondence must be addressed to or filed with the Recorder of the Board, at Harrisburg, so that the same may be prepared for presentation to the Board at the next session; and no application will be heard or considered unless the same, and papers upon which it is based, have been filed at least ten days before said session, and in no instance will this rule be released no application that has once been rejected will again be placed upon the record or heard by the Board without the consent of the Board first obtained therefor, and when submitted the second time, additional reasons, petitions, and proof of notices to Judge, District Attorney, and the public must be furnished anew, and no party will be per-mitted to occupy more than fifteen minutes in the oral discussion of any application upless by special request of the Board.
