The tragedy occurred at a time of great excitement in Utah. Brigham Young was then Governor of the Territory, and like-wise Superintendent of Indian Affairs, baying received his appointment to those offices from President Fillmore, though Alfred Comming, with a commission in his pocket from President Buchanan, was on his way to sopersede him as Governor, accompanied by a military force of about three thousand men, under the command of Col. Albert Sidney Johnson, to enforce lris claims. There had been great turbulence in Utah; numerous outrages on emigrants by persons in the guise of Indians had been ascribed to the Mormons; and the Gentile Judges of the Federal courts had all left the Territory, which in fact was in a state of rebellion. The question of armed resistance to the troops was serionsly discussed, though subsequently this idea was abandoned.

During this period of excitement, namely, in August, 1857, a large train of emigrants on their way to California reached Salt Lake City. THE GREAT SWIM .- J. B. Johnson, the English swimmer, won the match for the championship and stake of \$2,000 against Thomas Coyle, of Chester, Pa. The distance to be swam was about thirteen miles, the terminus being at Gloucester Point, N. J., three miles below Philadelphia. The men jumped from a tag at Chester, at 1:45 p. m. Coyle lea for eight miles, when he gave out completely and was taken from the water in an exhausted condition, and

remained insensible up to a late hour. At the time he gave up he was a mile in advance of Johnston. The latter swam a mile and a half further and then asked to be removed from the water, as he had complied with the conditions of the contest and was entitled to the stakes. He had been in the water over three hours. The event was the occasion of great interest. No less than 5,000 persons followed the race in boats, and the gardens and beach at Gloncester were crowded with human beings.

PHILADELPHIA, July 23.—Coyle, the American swimmer in the race with Johnson, remained unconscious until oneo'clock this morning. He then slept and awoke all right. He says he was drugged by brandy which he took a few minutes before he became exhausted. He was feeling splendidy, and felt positive he could reach Glou-
