A Sequel to the Tragic Story.

WHY RALSTON, THE SAN FRANCISCO BAN-KER, COMMITTED SUICIDE-A DE-FALCATION OF OVER \$3,000,-000 DISCOVERED.

SAN FNANCISCO, September 4. - The Bulletin published an editorial this evening which, after referring to the course of the paper with regard to the Bank of California and Raiston, says : When the bank suspended last week, we thought it our duty to protect as far as possible depositors and other creditors of that institution. We published just so many facts as we believed would best serve that purpose, and no more. We then said that the failure was owing to the mismanagement of the late President, and that this mismanagement was, in short, without the knowledge of the

For these statements we were soundly abused. A vicious press undertook to marshal all the corrupt elements against us .-We were in possession of facts which we could not state, because we were most anxious that the directors, if possible, would contrive some way of extricating themselves. We preferred to suffer the assaults of enthat institution.

The directors, some of whom have always been staunch friends-of the Bulletin how atterly false is the pretence upon and are so now, have perfected their plans, by every creditor of the bank will be fully

We have full confidence both in the amity and in the good faith of these men .-They will redeem their pledge, and may ultimately make the bank stronger even than the one which suspended. It was rblicans s ek to divert attention from time that the Bulletin should be relieved from secrets which it has been abused for keeping. We therefore proposed to ask consent of the board of directors to relieve us from any further obligations to keep secret some facts within our knowledge.-Having done our best to protect others it is part of our duty to protect ourselves.

We are now authorized by D. O. Mills to say that the late President did, without the knowledge of the directors, use privately from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 of the bank's resurces, which amount remains unnaid. This was the cause of the recent failure. Probably elsewhere this would have been set down as a defalcation. We are also authorized by the same authority to say that there was an over-issue of stock, which over-issue has now been provided for. The particular use which was made of this large sum of money it is not our duty to mentson.

When these discoveries were made the connection of the late President with the institution was at once severed. Between \$3,960,000 and \$4,000,000 of money had gone out of the bank without the knowledge of a single director.

Then the heroine at the oars, as she felt the animal's breath in her face, raised a paddle and struck for her life, and as the blow fell across the deer's head the blood started from its nostrils, and it sank back helpless and seemingly dead, but really only stunned. The girls then started for the shore, leaving the deer struggling between life and death in the

Reaching the shore, one of the girls ran to a small log cabin, an eighth of a mile distant, in which lived a family by the name of Berger, and told what had occurred. Mr. Berger seized his rifle and went to the pond, where he found the wounded deer yet struggling in the water, a few rods from the shore. He rowed out to it, and seizing it by the antlers, cut its throat, and then towed the body to the shore. > A RUN FOR LIFE. -On Tuesday afternoon, John Callighan, an orphan lad, aged about fourteen years, and hailing from Stroudsburg, Pa., met his death by being run over by the cars. Just before the 1:40 train on the L. & B. road reached the Park Hill bridge or culvert, young Callighan, who was standing on the track, ran across the culvert, and instead of stepping to one side, which he could easily have done, and averted the accident, continued his race on the track, notwithstanding the danger whistle of the engineer. He had run probably fifty feet after crossing the culvert when he was warned by a flagman near by of his danger, and told to get off the track. The boy evidently was so frightened that he was perfectly oblivious to his fate, for he took off his hat, and, increasing his speed, kept to the track. He had run but a short distance, however, when he was struck by the engine and carried along for some distance and burled over an enbankment. He had a terrible gash on the head, penetrating the skull, which produced death in about four minutes .- Monroe
