The State of Chihuabua is in the extreme northeast of Mexico. It is separated from the State of Texas on the northeast by the Rio Grande, and is bounded on the north by New Mexico and Arizora. The city of Chihuahua is the capital, The mines, of which there are several, are all situated in a mountain, about twelve miles from the city. It rises above the surrounding plain to a distance of 1,000 and 2,000 There is no place in Johnstown to be compared to feet, and is popularly known as the "Silver Mountain of Santa Eulalia." Wonderful stories are told of the wealth of these mines. They were constantly worked by the old Spanish proprietors from the time of their discovery in 1703 until 1822, the year of the revolution that drove the Spaniards out of the country. During this period Chihuahua grew from a mere outpost of the Jesuit missionaries into a city of 56,000 inhabitants, while the mining village of Santa Eulalia and another sprang up in the gorges of the mountain, containing respectively 8,000 and 5,000 cents) on every mark (pound) of silver, as it came from the refining furnaces, anywhere than at GEIS, FOSTER & QUINN'S. as it came from the refining furnaces, there was built, between 1738 and 1750, the celebrated Cathedral of Chihuahus, at a cost of \$100,000. While Mexico was in possession of the crown of Spain, the laws of that Kingdom required one-fifth of the product of all the mines of gold and silver to be paid into the Royal Treasury. This made it necessary for the products of their mints to be reported to the King's officers. These records were kept with Spanish formality in the different mints of the Vice-royalty, and the records of the mint of Chinhuahua, which are still preserved, show that nearly \$500,-000,000 were registered in that office, the miners of Sante Eulalia. The revolution, the Empire of Itur-

bide and the establishment of the Republic, involved a struggle of fourteen years, which greatly crippled the resources of the country. Then, four years later, came the expulsion of the Spaniards, who were the capitalists, and this was followed by constant internal revolutions, with wars with Texas, France (in '39), the United States, growing out of the annexation of Texas, and the conquest by Maximilian. These and the ravages of the Indians, who claimed the mining distriets, paralyzed Mexican industry, and put a long stop to the new development of riches that had hitherto been considered inexhaustible.—Nevada In- JOHNSTOWN, Pa. dependent.

When within five feet of completion, the chimney was struck by a gale from the northeast, which caused it to sway 7 feet 9 inches off the perpendicular, and it stood several feet less in height than before it swayed. To bring back the colosal shaft to its true vertical position, "sawing back" had to be resorted to, four men working at a time sawing, and two pouring water on tle saws. The work was done from the inside. Holes were first punched through the sides to admit the saws, which were wrought alternately in each direction at the same joint on the side opposite the inclination, so that the chimney was brought back in a slightly oscillating manner. This was done at twelve different heights, and the men discovered when they were gaining by the saws getting tightened by the superincumbent weight.



As soon as the Declaration of Independence was adopted a new seal became necessary for public papers. Some very odd devices were suggested. One was Moses with his rod dividing the Red Sea, while Pharaoh in his chariot | Nos. 278, 280 and 282 Washington St., was overwhelmed in the water. On the other side was a shield, containing in six compartments the symbols of the six countries from which the United States had been mainly peopled. Thus in one division there was a rose for England; in a second, a thistle for Scotland, in a third, a harp for Ireland; then a golden lily for France, a crowned lion for Holland, and a black eagle for Germany. Another device FURNITURE! was a representation of the Children of Israel in the Wilderness led by a cloud. A third represented Heroules resting on his club, while Virtue urged him up a rugged mountain-path, and Sloth pointed to a flowery down hill road. This last device was not very it seemed to point at a possible danger from laziness. All these, and a number of other suggestions, did not meet with general approval. At last, in 1782, after the matter had been discussed for about six years, John Adams, then in England, sent over the design suggested by this baronet, who, it appears, was an antiquary. The main device was an eagle with a shield on his breast holding in one talon an olive branch, and in the other a bundle of arrows, and bearing in his beak a scroll with the now familiar motto, E Pluribus Unum, one out of many. Without further parley this was adopted, and thus the seal of the United States came from Engiand.

The diet condemned the reformers and issued a decree in support of the doctrines of the ancient Church. Against this decree six Luthern princes and the deputies of thirteen towns of the empire formally protested on April 17, 1530. From this act the designation of Protestant, which then was derived. The Calvinists were subsequently included, and the title became general for all the sects outside of the original Christian Church. The six protesting princes were John and George, the Electors of Saxony and Bradenburg; Ernest and Francis, the two Dukes of Lunenburg; the Landgrave of Hesse, and the Prince of

THE DAYS OF THE WEEK .- According to the ancient Egyptian astronomy there were seven planets-two, the sun and moon, circling around the earth, the rest circling around the sun. These planets they arranged in order (beginning with the planet of the longest period), as follows: 1, Saturn: 2 Jupiter; 3, Mars; 4, the Sun; 5, Venus; 6, Mercury; 7, Moon. 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
