ACCIDENT TO THE LIMITED MAIL .- On Sunday afternoon the limited mail train met with an accident about four miles west of this place, near Warriorsridge station. The train was running at an ordinary rate of speed at the time of the accident, and was rounding a curve when one of the engineers observed a rock lying on the north or right hand track.
