

Sec. 8. Also, be it enacted and ordained by the authority aforesaid, that all cattle, horses, mules, etc. are to be enclosed at night, and on any owner thereof who shall refuse or neglect to do so a fine of one dollar will be imposed for each and every offence, along with costs. If any person or persons shall permit their stock to toicate Sections 2 and 3, agabore, the stock by trespassing will be impounded, and after a given ime will be sold for the fine imposed and costs accruing.
