THE BRICKS OF EGYPT .- The bricks of Egypt are still made of Nile mud, with an admixture of lime, straw and ashes, which are now burnt in kilns. An excellent lime is made of crushed stones, shells, &c., put in alternate layers with wood and bramble to the size of a small room This is set on fire, and care taken that the wind shall not blow into the pile.


