An Eloquent Tribute.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4, 1877. DECORATION DAY ADDRESS OF HON, RICH-ARD O'GORMAN. Among the many chaste and elegant orations which the ceremonies of Decoration

day called forth, we have seen none more eloquent and touching than the following delivered by Hon, Richard O'Gorman at Calvary cemetery, Brooklyn, N. Y., which, although in a special manner a tribute to the gailantly of the brave Irish soldiers, is withal broadly national in tone and spirit, in which all trace of partisan or sectional hate is buried in the ample folds of the white mantle of charity and fraternity. It is proper to say, in explanation of a reference made to that fact by Mr. O'Gorman, that among the graves visited was that of an unknown Confederate soldier, over which the Sixty-ninth's veteran corps planted a palmetto tree that had been sent to them for the purpose by the Irish volunteers of Charleston, S. C. The ladies of that city also sent magnolias to be scattered over the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike. Following is Mr. O'Gor-

MR. O'GORMAN'S ADDRESS. There are days in the summer time, so calm, so clear, so still, in their soit and dramy spice, dor, that it seems as if cloud could never come to darken their brightness, nor storm, with its rude breath, disturb their repose. Yet all the while, far away in the lonely ocean, the current may be brooding and mestering its arces and driving before it the cruel bases that shall stude the lofty steeples and loth smilling that into a night of terror and descin tion. So, too, a patient, in its hour of pence and prespectiv, is slow to believe that an era so lappy may not hat forever, and can jurilly dream of the dark consurracies that may natu-age its security of the growing antogonisms. whose ripened point may be civil commod or foreign war. And not more quickly does the summer sky durken at the first breath of the coming storm, than does the heart of scele-ty trendle with slarm, when it hears the clang of news, the boom of cannon and the storn of news, the boom of cannon and the storm summons of the trumper and the drum. Then, the weakness and the strength of the nation become apparent. Then, wealth, afficialted, flies to labor for protections. Then, tremplands and home and forge and anvil, comes forth the stanch and sturies mandred of the nation, to defend its rights and guard its honor. SEMI-CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION OF THE POPE'S EPISCOPACY-LARGE DEMON-STRATIONS IN NEW YORK, ST.

NEW YORK, JUNE 3 .- The semi-centernial of the consecration of Pope Pins IX, as Archbishop of Spoleto was celebrated today at St. Patrick's Cathedral. Solemn. high mass was celebrated. Dispatches from various quarters report that the Catholics generally celebrated the Pope's Golden Jubilee with appropriate and impres-

sive ouremendes. Sr. Louis, June 3.-The celebration of the Golden Jubilee of Pope Pius IX. to-day was one of the most notable in some of its features that has ever been witnessed here. It has been many years since an occasion has occurred to bring out the Irish and German Catholics together, and therefore but little opportunity has previously been had to observe the numerical strength of the various organizations of the different nationalties. To-day, however, brought them all out, and a splendid d play they made. The weather could not have been better. The rain of last night completely laid the dust, and cooled the atmosphere to a degree that made marching delicious. The different parts of the procession began to organize long before noon, and the streets were alive with societies, forming and marching to take their places preparatory to falling into the main line. At 2 P. M. everything was ready, and the column took up its line of march from Twentyfirst street and Lucas avenue, headed by

squads of mounted police. There were between seventy and eighty societies and organizations of different kinds in line, all gaily dressed in handsome uniforms and regalias, with beautiful banpers and proper floral decorations. About forty brass and martial bands furnished the music, and at frequent intervals the column was made brilliant with large, finely embellished wagons filled with elegantly dressed little boxs.

It is estimated that 20,000 persons were in line, including children. The streets along the line were densely thronged with spectators, and many houses were handomely decorated with American flags, the Pope's colors, portraits of the Pope, and floral designs.

LOUISVILLE, June 3 .- The celebration of the Pope's Jubilee to day was simply immense. It is estimated that 8,000 persons were in line, including all Catholic societies in the city with others from a distance. The procession was fifty minutes passing a given point. Eighty-seven carriages and a large number of wagons containing children were in procession. A grand concert was given at the Cathedral to-night, in which 150 performers participated. The church contained over 3,000.
