COURT PROCEEDINGS .- At 11:15 Monday forenoon His Honor Judge Dean and Associates Flanagan and Thomas took their seats on the bench and the June term of Court was thereupon declared convened. The Grand Jury was then called and Morris Lewis appointed foreman, after which the constables of the several boroughs, wards and townships appeared and qualified to their respective returns. The names of the members of the bar were then called in order to afford the attorneys present an opportunity to present motions, petitions, etc. Pending these proceedings Court adjourned until 2 o'clock

MONDAY APPERSONS'S SESSION. Court convened pursuant to adjournment and the calling of the bar list was resumed, an unusually large number of applications being presented, after which a case contin-

ued from last term, that of the Com'th vs. Daniel Porter, indicted for larceny, was called. The defendant, a young man of 18 or 19 years, was charged with steeling a pair of kip boots, the property of Vitus Preis-ter, miller, from the grist mill of Peter (araman, in Susquelanna township. Defendant's counset succeeded in proving an alib, and the ac-cused was as a consequence acquitted.

The following cases were then taken up in the order given and disposed of as indicated in the report appended :

Com'th vs. Frank Murray-assault and battery with intent to kill, simple assault and outre-ry, and carrying concealed deadly weapons.— The Grand Jury ignored the first count, but on the other two returned true bills. Counsel was assigned to the defendant, who plead guilty to assault and battery and went to trial on the charge of carrying concealed weapons. This case came from Millville borough, and the evidence elicited established the lact that on the 3d of July last the detendant and three other parties, all of whom were intoxicated, attacked Frederick Austle, the prescentor, and two or three companions, using a handy billy and fir-ing at complainent with a revolver. The cytdence developed an aggravated case and Judge Dean took occasion to condemn in unmeasured terms the practice of carrying concealed wea-pons, which he designated as "one of the crying poins, which he designated as "one of the crying evils of the day, the prime cause of many mur-ders, and a custom which calls for the severest condemnation of courts and juries." He also gave all who indulge in this reprehensible prac-tice to understand that they need expect no mercy from the Court. WHOLESALE POISONING IN GREENS-BURG .- We copy from Monday's edition of the Pittsburgh Commercial-Gazette the follow-ing particulars of a terrible crime committel on F.iday last by a colored lad, aged about fifteen years, named Abraham Lincoln Nimmy, who resided with his father and others of the family in Greensburg, Pas, and who was arrested the same evening and committed to prison, after having plend guilty the first if not the only victim of the tragedy, was married to Wm. Patterson, son of Wilson Patterson, colored, of Johnstown, where the Nimmy family resided for four years previous to January 1876 but as Patterson had failed to procure a divorce from his first bad failed to procure a divorce from his first wife, will in the flesh, the marriage was of course null and void. The paper from which we quote, after giving some of the above facts, goes on to say:

facts, goes on to say : The polsoning was done for the purpose of getting revenge, the boy having been severely punished by his father for some Juvenile oftense. The lad was a great favorite in the family of Judge Logan, and on Friday morning he went to a drug store, purchased four ounces of arsenic, having it charged to Judge Logan. He immediately took advantage of an opportunity that morning to mix the poison with the breakfast coffee. After breakfast the tarber, Samuel Nimmy, was taken ill, with terrible panis in his stomach. He was the only one who drank coffee at treakfast, but after dinner three other persons, Mrs. Pattersen, a married daughter of Mr. Ninnny, her nine mouths' old child, and Mrs. Harris, who was visiting the family, all became very sick, their symptoms being the same as in Mr. Nimmy's case. Drs. Townsend and Crawford were stan-moned, and after an examination they stated Suspicion pointing toward Lincoin Nimmy he was at once arrested, and upon being questioned asknowledged his full guilt. He didn't appear t Pempe head at all the magnitude of bis offense. After suffering terrible agony for an entire day, Mrs. Patterson died at four o'clock on Saturday evening, and there is but little probability of the recovery of her child, Mrs. Harris was better, and it seems likely that she and Mr. Nimmy will get well, though the latter is in a very critical condition. Mr. Nimmy is a well-known vocalist, and nuder of a band of singers known as the 'Nommy Family.'
They gave a cone of at Alliance, Ohio, on Decoration Day, and returned home to Greensburg on Thursday. Lincoln Nimmy is a very smart bey, and was quite a favorite with all who knew him. His incarcetation in juil doesn't seem to cause him much appropries, for he evidently, though mistakenly, thinks that because Judge Logan liked him he will get off easily.
