ACCOUNTS OF SCHOOL BOARDS .-- An Act of the Legislature was passed during the season of 1876 in relation to the publication of the accounts of School Boards, the provisions of which should be generally known to the directors of public schools, as the penalty prescribed for a violation or failure to comply with its regulations is very severe. The following is the full text of the law, which was approved by Gov. Hartrauft on the 1st of May, 1876; Sec. 1. Be it enacted, etc : 'That it shall be the

duty of each Board of School Directors, in the several School Districts of this Commonwealth, at the close of the school year, to place in the hands of the proper Auditors a full certified statement, Gemized, of their receipts and exstatement, Gemized, of their recepts and expenditures for the past year, including the ass-ts and liabilities of the district of all kinds,
with all books, papers and vouchers relating
to the same, to be by said Auditors examined
and, if found cortect, approved; such statement to be spread upon the minutes of the
Board of Directors, and in a condensed but
fully classified form published by said Board
in not less than ten written or printed hand
buils, or if decimed preferable, in the two newsreners of the county in which the district is papers of the county in which the district is situated having the largest circulation among the citizens interested; and for any neglect or failure to perform the duties enjoined by this set, the officers named therein shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not ex-ceeding \$300, to be paid into the School fund o Sec. 2. That the publication of the accounts of School Boards herein provided for shall be in lieu of all other publications of said accounts now required by law; and all acts or parts of acts inconsistent herewith be and they are hereby repealed; Provided, That the provis-

The wagon was blown over a precipice into the public road below, some 45 feet. It was broken into fregments, and one of the horses killed. Near by where the accident occurred, a large oak tree was up routed and hurled against the cottage of Har rison Prince The house was almost entirely demolished. Fortunately none of the inmates were injured. Hundreds of trees were torn from their roots and burned by a fire started




