THE LAND OF ROSES.

It is probably not generally known that the region in which General Gourko has been lately operating with his Cossacks is the land whence by far the greatest quantity of attar of roses comes to western Europe. Kasanlik, the name which has so often point of strategical importance, is also the centre of one of the most remarkable species of horticulture, or rather agriculture, to be found in the whole world.

Around it, or near it, are the districts of Cirpan, Giopea, Karadshah Dagh, Kojun-Tepe, Yeni Saghra, all of which are devoted to this peculiar husbandry. The Mussulman tradition assigns the origin of the rose to the night of Mohammed's journey to heaven. The white roses sprang from the drops of sweat which fell from the blessed forehead of the prophet himself in the toilsome ascent; the sweat rode, gave birth to the yellow ones: while the celestial drops which fell from Gabriel were the source of the red rose. The appearance of the neighborhood of Kasanlik would favor a suspicion that the heavenward journey must have sorely tried the archangel, and Count von Moltke, who was well acquainted with Bulgaria and the Balkans, has styled the valley of the Tundja "the Cashmere of Europe, the Turkish Gulistan, the Land of Roses."

Roses are not grown there as with us in isolated patches in gardens, but in fields and in ridges as if they were no better than potatoes. It would be difficult to imagine anything more charming than the appearance of those rose fields; and any painter who should attempt to reproduce this picture would assuredly be charged with exaggeration. But it would be impossible to catch the infinite alterations of color both among the roses themselves and the green leaves of the shrubs. Hundreds of millions of rose leaves strew the ground and are useless for the chief object in view. It is calculated that about one-fourth of the leaves are lost in his way; perhaps as much more either fail to come to the requisite perfection or are unavoidably wasted. The entire produce of the tekne, or region, of which Kasanlik is the centre, is estimated at eight hundred or nine hundred kilogrammes (from one hundred and ninety-five to two hundred and twenty imperial gallons) of rose oil. The wealth of water in the valley is prodigious; springs are not only numerous but most abundant in yield. There is a general system of irrigation which, remembering that the country is Bulgaria and not Lombardy, is admirable. The whole valley was a picture of prosperity; the result of natural fertil ty earefully tended by human industry. Where roses are now cultivated, heavy crops of maize are gathered, and along the slopes and down by the waterside are numerous herds and flocks. Kasanlik itself is a town of ten thousand inhabitants, and is surrounded by magnificent walnut

commercial industry. Von Moltke speaks of the situation as one of the rarest beauty. Many of the trees, he says, cover an extent of one hundred feet with their spreading branches, while countless wild pigeons fill the woods with their cooing. The murmering of the rush of waters is heard in every direction; the sky itself presents perpetually changing aspects by reason of the neighboring mountains; while the delicious fresh air is redolent with delicate perfume. About twenty-five miles to the southeast of Kasantik, and divided from the Tundja valley by a range of hills, is Eski Saghra, a town of eighteen thousand inhabitants, also a notable industrial centre, the best silk and finest wheat in Turkey being preduced in the surrounding district. With such diligent husbandmen a moderately fair government would soon make the whole southern Bulgawhich these beautiful and fertile valleys are now the theatre will have probably ruined the rose culture, at least for many a year .- London Times.

THE TAILOR BIRD.

This wonderful bird lives only in India. It has a beak shaped very much like a shoemaker's awl, and after selecting a large leaf hanging from the end of a twig, it pierces a number of holes along the edges of it with this awl-like beak; it then gets the long fibres of plants, which make capital thread, and carefully sews the leaf up into a complete bag. But strange and cleverer still, if the leaf is not large enough, the bird will get another leaf, pierce it with holes, and sew the two together. Now let me tell you a very singular thing, but something that is true. Sometimes this good tailor has been known to tie a knot at the end of the thread, so as to be sure it does not slip through! Have not some of us, some time or other, been in distress for want of a knot at the end of our thread, and sighed over half a dozen stitches put in, when out they all came with the end of the thread in the air, just for want of a knot in it? Next time we'll remember the tailor bird and his knots, won't we? Now perhaps you are wondering how eggs can lie and birds be hatched between a couple of leaves? So listen to me while I tell you all about it. The leaves are only the outer walls of a snug little house. The inside is made entirely of soft white down, and this makes one of the most comfortable beds possible for the eggs that are intended to lie upon it. The door to this dear little house is at the top, and Sheet Metals, the whole nest is built in such a way that it does not look like a nest, and is often taken for nothing but a bunch of leaves on the tree. The bird and its nest full of eggs are so very light that the very end of the slenderest twig will support both house and familv. This little tailor is entirely yellow in color, and is only three inches long. Wouldn't you like to see this tiny, elever thing hard at work sewing up its nest, selecting the leaves, and then carrying to them the long pieces of thread, and piercing the holes with its beak, and drawing the thread through them? What a dear little tailor the bird is!

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
