SHAD PLANTING About 600,000 young shad were planted in the Potomac river this week from the United States steamer Lookout. The United States Fish Commissioners have been engaged in collecting shad eggs at Albermarle Sound, from which place the vessel left for this city with the Ferguson hatching machine, by the aid of which the hatching process consumes only from three to five days, and by the time the vessel reached Washington the young were about three inches long. Cans containing the young shad are let down over the sides of the vessel and their contents allowed to escape. Planting was commenced and continued at intervals all the way up the river. The vessel started with 800,000 shad eggs, but a fresh supply of water at Norfolk was introduced into the hatching machine, and owing to some deleterious matter in the water a number of the eggs were destroyed.
