HORSE TRIEF CAUGHT.-Constable John Wherley, of this place, who, by the way is one of the most efficient and indefatigable police officers in the county, received a dispatch on last Friday forenoon from Mr. Henry Trump, of Derry township, Westmoreland county, informing him that a sixyear-old gray mare had been stolen from the pasture-field of that gentleman on the night previous, and as the thief was known to nave started in this direction he was re-

quested to be on the look out for him. Takog in the situation at once, Mr. Wherley instituted inquiries and sona ascertained from Mr. James Myers, night watchman at the railroad station, that a mare answering he description given had been ridden brough town about 3 o'clock that morning. and, as was subsequently learned, passed through Carrolitown about 5 a. m. After waiting until the arrival of the moraing train in hopes that the owner of the stolen animal would put in an appearance, Mr. Wherloy started in pursuit of the thief, Mr. Trump, accompanied by his brother, meantime taking the train at Blairsville and reaching this place on Friday night. Trump first called at the residence of Mr. Wherley, where they learned that he had started on his mission, and thence proceeded to Carrolltown, only to find that the vigilant officer referred to was matry miles.
