

This seems a strange anomaly, but it is a fact. The milk comes in the shape of fact. The milk comes in the shape of curd from butter and cheese-making counties in New York, and looks, on its arrival, a good deal like popped

The potatoes mature ad more than two weeks later than those planted early, the growth being very rapid on account of the more thorough preliminary tillage of the seed beli which can be peformed to much better advantage than between the rows of planted crops. Another advantage is that at this late planting season the potito bugs have got well established in their fields of labor, and will be much less upt to visit the crop, and if they do, the more rapid growth will counteract their rayages. In order to keep the seed in good condition for late planting he keeps his cellar where it is stored at as low a temptore as will be safe from freezing through the Winter and Spring. Should they be gin to spront too much before philling, they are spread a foot deep upon the barn floor and shoveled over unitsionally In this way he has been successful in growing about twesty five acres potatoes annually, vielding from 200 to 300 bushels to the accuand not cos ing more than \$2 worth of ng.




