

REMEDIES FOR THE FARMER.

1st. Never get in debt when you cannot see your way out again. When you owe, pay as fast as you can and promptly. Never allow yourself to be dunned for a debt a second time without paying it. Credit for promptness is of great advantage in any kind of business and all through life.

2d. Never enlarge your farm when half of what you own is not half cultivated.

3d. If you own more land than you can till well, area debt, or need funds to make necessary improvements, sell part of your farm and use the money to pay your debts and make your improvements.

4th. Never borrow money to build a showy house when a less pretentious one would answer better, and never lead money when you have poorly tilled land to improve.

5th. Lay out a system of improvements for your farm and buildings, and use your means to carry these plans out.

6th. Do not enter upon speculation with other people's money, or your own, unless you see clearly that you will make profits, and even then do not do it to the neglect of your farming.

7th. Do not keep poor stock when you can keep good stock at the same expense and with much more profit.

8th. Do not try to grow crops for which your farm is not well adapted.

9th. If you have a good location do not sell out, expecting to better it because you have been offered a good price.

10th. Do not change farms often, for by so doing you can carry out no definite system of improvement.

11th. Unless your crops are good, sow less and farm better.

12th. Be present with your employees as much as possible, otherwise little will be done, and that little very poorly. No business requires the master's oversight more than farming.

13th. Keep ahead of your work or your work will keep ahead of you.

14th. Resolve that your farm shall be a profitable one if industry and good management will make it so.

15th. Invest your surplus earnings in making such improvements as will add to the profit, appearance and convenience of your farm.

16th. Be kind, not only to those you employ, but to all the animals you work and feed.

17th. Make yourself thoroughly acquainted with the principles of agriculture and be guided by them.

18th. Perform all labor at the right season.

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FACTS FOR THE CURIOUS.

The greyhound runs by the evening only, and this we observe as a fact. The carrier pigeon flies his 250 miles homeward by the evening—namely, from point to point of objects which he has marked; but this is only one conjecture.

A cloud of ten thousand quarts descends upon the sun, the minimum interval between them, yet no one can knock another upon the grass or break a leg or wing, long and deftly as they are. Suddenly, amid your unmatchable admiration of this descent, a peculiarly high shouldered, vigorous, with long, pendant nose, dashes out of the rising and falling cloud, and settling on your check, inserts a poisonous sting. What possessed the lightning to do this? Did he smell your breath in the mazy dance? No one knows.

A carriage comes suddenly upon a flock of geese on a narrow road, and drives straight through the middle of them. A goose was never yet taken run over, nor a duck. They are made to fly over the wheels and hoofs, and somehow they contrive to flap and waddle safely off. Habitually stupid, heavy and indolent, they are nevertheless equal to the emergency.

Why does the lonely woodpecker, when he descends his tree and goes to drink, stop several times on his way, listen and look round before he takes his draught? No one knows. How is it that the species of ant, which is taken in battle by other ants to be made slaves, should be black ants? No one knows.

The power of judging of actual danger, and the free and easy boldness which results from it, are by no means uncommon. Many birds seem to have a correct notion of a gun's range, and while scrupulously careful to keep beyond it confine their care to this caution, though the most obvious reason would be right away out of sight and hearing, which they do not choose to do. And they sometimes appear to make even an astute allusion to their power, fairly putting their wit and cleverness in antagonism to that of man for the benefit of their fellows.

1535.—The negroes on the plantations of the West Indies began to use it. 1559.—Jean Nicot, French envoy to Portugal, sent some of the seeds to Paris, and from him it acquired the name of Nicotiana. When it was first used in France it was called "Herbe de Grande Prieur," of the house of Lorraine, who was very fond of it. It was called "Herbe de St. Croix" from Cardinal St. Croix, who first introduced it into Italy.

1570.—At this date in Holland tobacco was smoked in conical tubes, made of palm leaves plaited together. 1575.—First appeared a print of the plant in Andre Thevet's Cosmographie.

1585.—The English first saw the Indians of Virginia use clay pipes, from which time they began to be used in Europe. 1604.—James the First of England sought to abolish the use of tobacco by very heavy imposts upon it.

1610.—The smoking of tobacco was indulged in at Constantinople. To render the custom ridiculous, a Turk detected thus ridiculing the plant, was led through the streets with a pipe thrust through his nose. 1615.—The cultivation of tobacco was begun in Holland.

1619.—James the First ordered that no planter cultivate more than one hundred pounds. 1620.—Smoking introduced into Germany. 1631.—First introduced into Austria by Swedish troops. 1634.—The use of tobacco forbidden in Russia under a penalty of having the nose cut off.

1653.—First used in Switzerland, where the magistrates at first punished those found smoking; but the custom soon became too general to be suppressed. 1690.—Pope Innocent XII excommunicated all who should take snuff or use tobacco while at church.

1724.—Pope Benedict revealed the above bull, as he himself used tobacco immediately. To HEAL A CUT—Without waiting for it to stop bleeding, press the edge of the lacerated flesh together, and apply immediately a plaster made of soot and cream, binding it firmly so that it not be removed till healed, without cleanliness requires it. Then put another of the same on, without delay, not allowing exposure to the air any more than possible to prevent.
