SOME FACTS ABOUT LIME. Several correspondents ask for information concerning the use of lime on land, and all of them contain evidence of several commonly accepted but false theories.

Lime, however, has an important effect aside from its action and plant food. Fresh burned lime (known as "caustic lime" and "quicklime") has a strong affinity for carbonic acid, so that when it and organic matter (which always contains a large portion of carbonic acid) are mixed together the lime and carbonic acid unite, promoting the decomposition of organic matter.

Free acids, and those in easily decomposed substances, are also broken up by lime, and many insoluble compounds, as of iron or zinc, are rendered harmless. In some cases insoluble silicates, of potash, etc., are combined; but the action of lime will break up these combinations and set the potash from use as plant food.

The above statements show that the main action of lime in the soil is making available plant food which was before unavailable. Therefore when it may increase the crop yield of a field, it will tend to bring about a final exhaustion, unless plant food is added. In heavy clay soils, the above mentioned chemical reaction of lime destroys their tenacity and makes them friable and porous.

DANGEROUS PLANTS.—The English nettle is very innocent compared with some of its foreign relatives. In the northern part of New South Wales for instance, the Giant Nettle sometimes reaches the height of 120 to 150 feet, and its leaves, twelve to fifteen inches broad, are armed with prickles that produce severe and sometimes dangerous effects.

TREES THAT GROW SHIRTS.—Humboldt says that he saw on the slopes of the Cerro de la Cruz trees 50 feet high. The Indians cut off cylindrical pieces 2 feet in diameter, from which they peel the red and fibrous bark without making any longitudinal incision. This bark affords them a sort of garment which resembles a sack of very coarse texture, and without a seam. The upper opening serves for a head, and two lateral holes are cut to admit the arms. The natives wear these shirts of Marina in the rainy season; they have the form of cotton which are so common in New Granada, at Quito, and in Peru.
