THE OLD PORTAGE RATE ROAD .- A few weeks ago a Hollidaysburg correspondent of the Altoona Sua furnished that paper with a we read carefully, and being satisfied of its correctness from our own personal recollection of the commencement and completion of the road, we preserved the paper for future use, and although it contains nothing really new, we lay before our readers a synopsis of its main features, adding thereto a few local and personal references, and also our own knowledge of the subsequent career of most of the persons named by the writer, who originally located and superintended the construction of what was then justly regarded throughout the world as an unequaler triumph of engineering skill.

The commencement of the construction of the Allegheny Portage Railrond was authorized by an act of the Legislature of Penn-sylvania, passed the 21st day of March, A. D. 1831. Previous to that time surveys of the Allegheny mountains had been made by veral eminent engineer, and these surveys bad thrown much light on the topography of the country through which the railroad was to pass. Sylvester Welch, Esq., was appointed principal engineer of the work by the board of Canal Commissioners, and he organized his locating party and had the lents pitched near Lilly's mill, at the head of the mountain branch of the Conemaugh, on the 12th day of April, 1831. The locating party at the beginning consisted of Sylvester Welch principal engineer; Solomon W. Roberts, principal assistant engineer: Patrick Griffin, surveyor; and twelve assistants, axemen and cook. The line commenced at the head of the Little Conemany and continued down the valley of that stream to Johnstown, a distance of 21 miles where it connected with canal. The western end of the railroad was located on the 14th day of May, 1831. In the month of May, Mr. W. Milnor Roberts joined the corps as principal assistant engineer and traced the line from the turnpike crossing, near the summit of the mountain, to Lilly's

mill, a distance of five miles. The letting for the grading and masonry of these twenty-six miles of the road from the Summit to Johnstown took place at Ebens-burg on the 26th of May, 1831. It was em-phatically a big day in this place, scores of railroad contractors from all sections of Pennsylvania and many from other States being in attendance. The engineer's office was in the upstairs front room of the building now occupied by Michael Latterner as a hotel, and the sealed bids for the different ctions of the road were received there by Mr. Welch and his assistants. Samuel Jones. afterwards a banker and broker in Pittsburg, where he died several years ago, was superin-tendent any paymaster of the road, and had his office in the room under the engineer's office, now used by Mr. Latterner as a bar-

The letting of the read from the Summit to Hollidaysburg, a distance of ten and two-third miles, took place at Hollidaysburg on the 29th of July, 1831—thus putting under contract the whole of the road, thirty-six and two-third miles. The work upon the road was prosecuted vigorously, about two thousand men being employed upon it, and the first track was so advanced as to permit the passage of an experimental car over its entire length on the 26th of November, 1833. nishing the power on the inclined planes only.
