The family of Mrs. McCune consists of two daughters and a grandson, the latter named Clement Barke. It appears from the statements made by the landlady that the boarders got along pleasantly up until Saturday evening last, when a slight dispute arose, in which Anderson Volt displayed considerable bad temper. He appeared to be in guad enough humor during Sunday, and went to work as usual on Manday merning.
