In pursuance of this avocation he made a coat in February, 1879, for a man who at present resides in El-der township, this county, but who, it seems, did not have the wherewithal to pay for the garment at the time the work was done—
He promised, however, to "sock up" the
amount, five dollars, inside of two weeks
from the time of delivery, and having no
doubt about his honesty, Mr. Long permitted
him to depart with the coat in his possession. Not only the weeks but many others passed into oblivion, and yet the man with the coat came not to pay for the making of it. In fact, Mr. Long neither saw nor heard of him for many long months, and then the unsafts-factory information reached him that the man he had trusted had been sent to the penitentiary for horse-stealing.
