Involuntary Crusoes have mostly become so from pure accident, but there are some instances to the contrary. Seaman Jeffrey, of H. M. S. Doubtless Captain Lake repented the deed, when, on his return to the same latitude some two months afterward, the boat sent to bring the offender on board again returned with the report that he was nowhere to be found. At any rate the Captain had good cause to repent it a little later on, for, upon the matter coming to the knowledge of the Admiral on the West Indian Station, Lake was tried by courtmartial and dismissed the service. At home Sir Francis Burdett brought the case before Parliament, and a search was instituted for the missing man, resulting in his being brought to England in October, 1809. He had lived on the rock of Sombrero for nine days, subsisting upon limpets and birds' eggs, when, luckily for all concerned, he was taken off by an American schooner, and landed at Marbiehead, Massachusetts.

A Dutch skipper once thought to get rid of a bad bargain in the same way. Putting into St. Helena, then uninhabited, to bury a dead officer, he left there a seaman who had been condemned to death. Disinclined to accept the situation, the caiminal unearthed the coffin, and, after turning out its occupant, launched it on the water, and, thank to a calm falling, succeeded in overtaking the ship. The Captain, thinking his plack deserving of recognition, received him on deck, a pardoned man.

Alone in his glory, the Captain spent his time preparing clothes , from the skins of seals and collecting food for the winter, never emitting to ascend a hill once or twice a day on the chance of descrying a ship. After dwelling thus in solitude for some months Barnard was rejoined by the runaways, who found that they could not get on without him. The return was not an unmitigated blessing. One of them planned his murder, for which the Captain had him conveyed to a small island in Quaker Harbor, and left there, until him to express penitence for his purpostrial of Crusoeing on New Island, - All the Year Round.



THE Mexican and Indian methods of harvesting grain are very primitive similar, indeed, to those of Eastern countries in the Bible times, The wheat is cut by hand with a sickle, and taken, unbound, in carts to the threshing-floor. This consists of a round plat of level ground in an elevated place fifty, one hundred, or two hundred feet in diameter, as the farm is a large or small one, the surface of which is round ed or trodden as hard as a cement floor, Around the edges of this, tall poles are set in the ground five or six feet apart, forming a circle. The unthreshed grain is piled up closely in the centre, and, when everything is ready, a thin layer is raked down between the central pile of grain and the circle of poles, and then a flock of goats or sheep, or sometimes of ponies, are driven around over the grain until it has all been beaten out of , the heads by their feet. The straw is then thrown outside the circle of poles, and the wheat pushed up towards the centre. Another lot of the unthreshed grain is then raked down and the operation repeated until the whole is threshed. I was forcibly reminded of the Scriptur-al injunction which forbade the Hebrews to muzzle the ox that trod the grain. The winnowing is also done in the Biblical way. After the wheat has been separated from the straw, it is gathered up into a heap, and when a brisk breeze arises it is thrown into the air in the teeth of the wind, which blows away the chaff while the wheat falls by itself on the clean floor.

BOILING WATER IN A SHEET OF PA-PER-Nature is publishing a series of attractive articles on "Physics Without Apparatus." In the latest number are given experiments for boiling water and melting lead on a piece of paper. Take a piece of paper and fold it up, as schoolboys do, into a square box without a lid Hang this up to a walking-stick by four threads, and other convenient props. Then a lamp or taper may be placed under this dainty cauldron. In a few minutes the water will boil. The only fear is lest the threads should catch fire and let the water spill into the lamp and over the table. The flame must, therefore, not be too large. The paper does not burn because the heat imparted to it on one side by the flame would be very rapidly conducted away by the water of the other.

Another experiment of a similar nature, but, perhaps, even more striking, is as follows: Twist up the edges of a common playing eard, or other bit of card board, so as to fashion it into a light tray. On this tray place a layer of small shots or bits of lead, and heat it over the flame of a lamp. The lead will melt but the card will not burn. It may be charred a little round the edges, but immediately below the lead it will not be burnt, for here again the lead conducts off the beat on one side as fast as it is supplied on the other.
