

Audubon says in regard to the courtship of the Canada goose: Those that had been previously mated renewed their courtship as early as the month of January, while others would be contending or coquetting for hours every day, until all seemed satisfied with the choice they had made, after which, although they remained together, any person could see that they were careful to keep in pairs. Thave observed, also, that the older the birds the shorter were the preliminaries of their courtship. The bachelors and old maids, whether out of regard, or not wishing to be disturbed by the bustle, quietly moved aside and lay down some distance from the rest.

'wall flowers' or 'gossipers,' evidently,' In the courtship of the Arapunga, or Gmana beli bird, the male makes curious note in the night, that can be heard a a distance of three miles. The true bell bird of New South Wales attracts the attention of the female by its powers of ventriloquism. Its notes often sound as if at a considerable distance, when in reality the bird is perched over the branch of a neighboring tree, the volume of sound gradually increasing until it appears to be just over the hear of the istener. The collared goatsucker, a native of the Cape of Good Hope' is also very assiduous, in its attentions during the breeding season, which commences in the month of September. He indulges in a very loud and singular song, which he begins about an hour after sunset, and often continues all night, if the weather be fine and light. Le Vaillant says that when he happened to encamp in the vicinity of these birds, the incessant song of the male rendered it impossible for him to sleep. Strange to say, notwithstanding the little care these birds seem to take to conceal their eggs, they are very jearous of these treasures, and remove them immediately on perceiving that they have been touch ed, each parent taking an egg in its mouth and flying off with it.

THE CHANGE IN THE FROG. - NOwhere in the animal kingdom is there so favorable an opportunity for peeping into nature's workshop as in the metamorphoses of the frog. The animal is a worm when it comes from the egg, and remains such for the first four days of its life, having neither eyes nor ears, nostrilsnor respiratory organs. It crawls. It breathes through its skin. After a while a neck is grooven into the flesh, Its soft lips are hardened into a horny beak. The different organs one after another bud out, then a pair of branching gills, and last a long limber tail, The worm has become a fish-a politicooger tadpole. Three or four more days elapse, and the gills sink back into the body, while in their places others come, much more complex, arranged in vascular tuits, 112 in each. But, they, too, have their day, and are absorbed, together with their framework of bone and cartilage, to be succeeded by an entirely different breathing apparatus, the initial of a second cortelated group of radical changes. CORN AND CORN BREAD. -- If the inhabitants of North America were each to save three cents a day in their housekeeping the total saving would amount to the sum of over 700 millions of dollars. in the year,-This enormous sum may be saved by very moderate economy in household affairs. In the single item of food it may be saved over and over again in cooking or using a cheaper food,-The cheapest food in the world is Indian corn; and this valuable grain is too much neglected in the household, because few housekeepers know how to prepare it acceptably. But it may be used whole, partly broken, or ground, in a great variety of shapes and manners, and if one were to be reduced to a single article of food by any chance, the most useful one would doubtless be Indian corn, providing eggs, milk, sugar, and a little spice could be thrown in for trimmings. As a matter of cost it might be mentioned that the usual difference in cost is greatly in favor of corn as compared with other kinds of food .-Wheat is usually 24 times as dear as corn; potatoes four times as dear, considering that three fourths of them are water: and corn is a better food for the winter than either wheat or potatoes because it is much richer in oil or fat, Why then don't people eat more corn ? Simply because of ignorance of its value or of the best methods of cooking it.

CURING BALKY HORSES. - A Cauadian horseman who is in favor of curing a balky horse in the quickest way condemas all whipping and ill usage of that sort. His plan is to drive until the balk comes, "then I step down; he expeets me to use the whip. As a crimi-nal I treat him on the silent system. I push him back a little out of the way, I show him the strap, putting it up to his nose. I go to the off-side and buckle it to his fore leg, close to his breast throwing the other end over his should. er; I then raise the near foot and fix it with the hoof nearly touching the belly. This done, I say, 'Now, old chap, you just stand there,' I don't smoke, so I take a paper from my pocket, and finding a place where I can sit down, and he sees me, I begin to read. This is something he did not bargain for, and the novelty of standing on three legs somewhat diverts his mind fron the cause that stopped him, I think this is the chief point to be gained and the most humane. When the strap is taken off I show it to him, caress him a litle, and we move on without irritation. The strap will now become a part of the harness for a month or two, till at last the sight of it will act as a talisman.'

FERTILIZING THE CORN CROP .- F. York, Pa., writes: "Farmers planting corn on land that is imperfectly drained will, in my opinion, get the most good from fertilizers if these are applied in hills or drills so as to elevate the roots of the plant as much as possible. But it is bad policy to plant undrained band in corn. A mistake often committed is letting the seed come in contact with the manure, which is a very unsafe p'an and not to be advised even when the material used is thoroughly decomposed. The best crops I have ever harvested were manured with stable and barnyard scrapings applied after the land (sod) was broken up. It was well harrowed in and then a special corn fertilizer lightly sprinkled over that and covered with a harrow,'

To PREVENT a cow from sucking herself, buckle on a common five-ring horse halter; but in her mouth a joint bridle bit; this will not interfert with her eating and drinking, but prevents her curling her tongue around the teat. 
