But the phylloxera, though a thousand times smaller than the fly, is a mammoth in comparison with many of the creatures that are enemies to man, Just now the mere name of one of these animalculæ is menacing an important branch of our foreign commerce. The trichina is disturbing the business relations of two continents; and not only merchant, but legislators and statesmen as well, are excited on the subject, And what is this formidable trichina? A parasitic worm about a hundredth of an inch in length, yet more terrible to man than the anaconda, or boa-constrictor. Its very existence was unknown fifty years ago, and its real nature and habits were not understood till within twenty years or so. The reader does not need to be told that under certain circumstances it infests the flesh of the hog, and that the diseased pork, if eaten by man without being thoroughly cooked, may transfer the parasite to the human muscles, with dangerous and often fatal results. No wonder that our foreign friends are alarmed when they are told that American pork is liable to be of this trichinous character. The reports may be false or exaggerated, perhaps, set affoat by interested parties who want to keep our pork out of their markets; but the trichina in none the less a frightful reality, and the risk of its presence in pork can not be too vigilantly guarded against, both at home and abroad, from commercial no less than

hygienic considerations. But space will not permit us to refer in detail to the numberless organisms, animal and vegetable, whose power for evil is as great as their size is insignificant. Here belong nearly all the forms of mildew, blight, rot and the like, which are the cause of such wide-spread injury and destruction in the vegetable kingdom. The great majority of these pests are themselves low forms of vegetable life of a fungous nature. Their power of growth and reproduction are marvellous, and their life is the disease or death of the higher species of plants which they infest. We have tried the method of training recommended, and know it to be convenient, and promotive of the growth and vigor of the vines: When the plants are ready for the garden, make a considerable hill of good compost. Chip manure is excel-lent, and a quantity of chicken manure long stake through it. This may be six feet high. Set the plant near it. The training will require attention. The plant will immediately begin to sucker, or throw out site shoots just above each eaf. These must be cut off, and then the plant will run vigorously. CURE FOR CATARRH.-The following, handed to the Somerset Democrat by a lady friend, is said to be infallible : "Take a large pinch of iron weed, put it in a small tin cup; pour over it sufficient vinegar to boil it, or to make a steam; cover the tin cup with a funnel to inhale the steam'through the nostrils by placing the tube of the funnel in the nostrils. This should be done three or four times daily. Apply to the temples and on the forehead plantain leaves at night by binding on with a cloth; rub the plantain leaves through the hands to extract the juice. If plantain leaves cannot be got, cabbage leaves will do. If the vinegar should prove to strong dilute with water. When the head can bear it use the full strength vinegar."

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

CURIOUS WORKS OF ANTS.

At the recent Southboro' session of the Massachusetts State Board of Agri-culture, Prof. E. S. Morse gave the following enrious particulars about ants: The ant belongs to a family of insects such as wasps, bees, hornets, but is the superior of them all, as are the elephant, the horse and the dog in other lines of animal life. Ants are constructed with the "back" bone in front, and the heart and other internal organs on the opposite side are put together upside down as we might think. Ants' heads are presented to the cut surface, which they grasp with the nippers, when their bodies are cut off, leaving a whole row of them to hold the flesh. As an illustration of their ingenuity and intelligence, it was stated that they sometimes excavate tunnels under rivers of considerable depth and width, and use the tunnels for transporting supplies. They dig wells twenty feet deep and a foot in diameter for drinking water. The harvesting ants plant seeds on farms, which they cultivate with great skill and neatness, keeping every weed down and harvesting the grain, curing and storing it safely in weatherproof cavities in the soil. They also organize into divisions with commanders, each individual dolng a certain kind of work. Some ants are smart enough for engineers, while others only know enough to do as they are told. They can count and make correct estimates of the magnitude of an undertaking, as proved by observers.

Eight chrysolides (often called the eggs of ants,) were placed in a path where ants travel. A single individual found them and undertook to carry them to their home. Several were carried by the single ant patiently enough, but when twenty chrysolides were placed in the heap, another ant was found engaged in the work. The pile was increased at intervals till eighty ants engaged in the undertaking, showing that workers were detailed accord ing to the demands of the cases. Ant's battles sometimes last many days, in one case seven weeks, the victors finally taking the stores and removing them to their own houses. Their wars are quite as justifiable as those of men when the object-pillage-is the same.

They have the power, too, of knowing members of their own communities even after six months' absence. Strangers are always driven off or killed. They are very helpful to each other, and show sympathy in case of accident or sickness. Some families of auts build arched roads covered by an arch of clay or mortar for protection against enemies, and show great skill in the work' which is under the supervision of trained engineers, who order a rebuilding if the work is not perfect. Some kinds of ants keep cows, build cow-yards, and milk their cows regularly, and don't throw milking stools at them either to make them "give down," but stroke and pat their backs very tenderly. Of course these cows are the plant aphides, so familiar to all farmers and gardeners.

FRESH WATER SPRING IN THE AT-LANTIC.—One of the most remarkable displays of nature may be seen on the Atlantic coast, eighteen miles south of St. Augustine. Off Matanzas Inlet, and three miles from shore, a mammoth fresh-water spring gurgles up from the depth of the ocean with such force and volume as to attract the attention of all who come in the immediate vicinity. This fountain is large, bold and turbu lent. It is noticeable to fishermen and others passing in small boats along near the shore. For many years this wonderful and mysterious freak of nature has been known to the people of St. Augustine and those living along the shore, and some of the superstitions ones have been taught to regard it with a kind of reverental awe, or holy horror, as the abode of supernatural influences, When the waters of the ocean in its vicinity are otherwise calm and tranquil the upheaving and troubled appearance HAVING gained an envir of the water shows unmistakable evidences of internal commotions. An area of about half an acre shows this troubled appearance-something similar to the boiling of a washerwoman's kettle. Six or eight years ago Com. Hitchcock, of the United States Coast Survey, was passing this place and his attention was directed to the spring by the upheaving of the water, which threw his ship from her course as she entered the spring. His curiosity becoming excited by this circumstance, he set to work to examine the surroundings, and found six fathoms of water everywhere in the vicinity, while the spring itself was almost fathomless.

MEASURING BUILDING MATERIALS, The following figures are worth remembering, as they will save a great deal of Icalculation and give approximately accurate results with a minimum of labor. A cord of stone, three bush-els of lime and a cubic yard of sand will lay one hundred cubic yards of wall, Five courses of brick will lay one foot in height on a chimney. Nine bricks in a course will make a flue eight inches wide and twenty inches long, and eight bricks in a course will make a flue eight inches wide and sixteen inches long. Eight bushels of good lime, sixteen bushels of sand and one bushel of hair will make enough mortar to plaster one hundred square yards. One-fifth more siding and flooring is needed than the number of square feet of surface to be covered, because of the lap in the siding and matching of the floors. One thousand laths will cover seventy yards of surface, and eleven pounds of lath nails will nail them on. One thousand shingles laid four inches to the weather will cover over one handred square feet of surface, and five pounds of shingle nails will fasten them on.

THE TURPENTINE REMEDY, -An aged physician in Washington, who has retired from practice, a man of extensive learning and high character, says that the younger practitioners laugh at him recommending turpentine as a remedy for disease of the lungs. He contends that they have nothing better to suggest; indeed they have no remedy for consumption. He claims that in twenty-seven clear cases of throat disease the use of this remedy under his own directions, has restored the several parties to fair health, one of these being his wife, and another being a man who, from being unable to sit or lie in a prostrate position, has been for five years past doing engineer's work in the Treasury. The remedy is simple. Procure at a drug store some white turpentine take in the mouth a bit the size of a pea; swallow the slowly dissolving substance, and when it is quite soft swallow the lump. The same remedy is excellent for a cold. This medicine is an old one, not at variance, however, with the modern notion of sending patients to piny regions to inhale turpentine odors. CHLORIDE OF LIME, -A French jour-

nal says that rats and mice can be driven away by scattering chloride of lime asserts that a solution of it brushed over plants will protect them from insects, or if scattered over ground infested with grubs it will free it of them entirely. Bunches of cotton or tow smeared with a mixture of chloride of lime and hog's lard, and tied about different parts of the age of the patient may be. Price, facts. Sold by Braggists.

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
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
