Bindewalt at once made his way to his boarding house, not far away, where he was soon after found in bed and arrested by an officer. All were given a hearing and each fined \$5 and costs, or six days in the lock-up. Each of the principal parties succeeded in obtaining the requisite bail, and all of them were soon after released. 
