AMMONIA AS A HAIR STIMULANT .-Professor Erasmus Wilson, of London, gives the weight of his eminent authority in favor of ammonia as a healthful stimulant for the bair, being preferable because it is unlikely to create inflammation and its consequences; it is neither absorbable into the system, nor could it do harm if such were the case; and its odor, refreshing at the moment of its use, speedily evaporates. In a case of ordinary madesia, or falling out of the hair, Professor Wilson precribes a lotion composed of strong liquid ammonia, almond oil and chloroform, of each one part dissolved with five parts alcohol or resemary, and made fragrant by the addition of a drachm of the essential oil of lemons, the lotion to be dabbed upon the skin of the head after through friction with the hair brush,

OLD FENCES .- Half of the weeds that trouble farmers are harbored along old and useless fences. A fence that is not a barrier against stock is always harmful and useless, inasmuch as few farmers think it necessary to clean the weeds from the line of fences so long as the rest of the field is kept clean. He forgets the seeds that are blown over his own and his neighbors grounds from these very weeds. Have only such fences as are 'strictly necessary and keep the soil along them clean.
